New York, Feb. 16—(UP) —Stocks advanced today for the fifth consecutive session. The general average reached a new high since 1937.

Gains extended to more than 2 points with Rails leading. The Rail average set a new top since August 25, 1937; Industrial, high since November 12, 1938 and Utility, high since August 18, 1937.

Improvement developed in stocks around mid-session after some profit-taking in the morning. Chrysler led the way and at its top of 103 1/4 was up 2 points. Steels picked up under the lead of U. S. Steel. New highs were noted in A. M. Byers, Crucible Steel, and Youngstown Sheet & Tube.

Preliminary closing Dow-Jones stock averages were: Industrial 158.23, off 0.01; Railroad 51.22, unchanged; Utilities 28.19, up 0.04; 65 stocks 59.22, up 0.01.

Sales totaled 1,900,000 shares compared with 1,870,000 shares yesterday.

OREGON SENATORS URGE LIMITATION UPON PRESIDENCY

Salem, Ore., Feb. 16—(UP) —The Oregon senate, closely following party lines of its 5 to 1 Republican membership, today passed to the house a joint memorial asking congress to limit the presidency to two terms.

With the house also 5 to 1 Republican, quick passage was predicted.

Sen. Lew Wallace of Portland, Democratic national committee-man from Oregon, attacked the memorial on grounds "this legislation has more to do than send such memorials to congress — It is not the business of this legislature to tell congress what to do." He cited the 27,000 Democratic majority in Oregon for a fourth term for President Roosevelt.

Sen. Frank Hilton, Portland Republican, said the only excuse given for the fourth term was "not to change horses in mid-stream," whereas the two-term issue was fundamental because any president can swing a close election through the tremendous patronage at his disposal. He said the limitation should not be a partisan affair.

Earlier, the house passed and sent to the senate a bill (H. B. 356) known as the joint merit system act consolidating the merit system councils of the public welfare commission, unemployment compensation commission, board of health and board of higher education.

Five Medford boys have successfully passed all required tests and were enlisted in the U. S. naval reserve on February 12, according to Chief Stewart of the Medford navy recruiting station. Broedlow, son of Col. and Mrs. R. W. Broedlow, 535 Haven street.
