

KLAMATH RIVER DIVERSION MEET SET FOR YREKA

William G. Bailey, managing editor of the Siskiyou Daily News, of Yreka, Calif., was in Medford Saturday in regard to the hearing slated Wednesday at 10 a. m. in Yreka regarding the army engineers' activities looking to the diversion of the Klamath river into the Pit or McCloud and thence into Shasta dam lake.

Col. K. M. Moore, chief engineer from the army engineers office in San Francisco, will be chairman of the meeting to be held in the supervisor's room in the Siskiyou county court house, and Otto von Seggern, army engineer civilian employee, will be present with data from the engineer's office.

Officials of the bureau of reclamation, which has charge of the Shasta dam project, have denied there was any error in their calculations as to the amount of water that would flow into the lake behind the dam, and the federal power commission has denied any connection with the present army engineers' activity, Bailey said. He added that check-ups in Washington by Congressman Clair Engle, failed to show why the proposed diversion project is necessary. Bailey declared his belief that Siskiyou county, California, and Klamath county, Oregon, would present a united front against building any canal that would permit diversion of Klamath basin water into the Sacramento river watershed.

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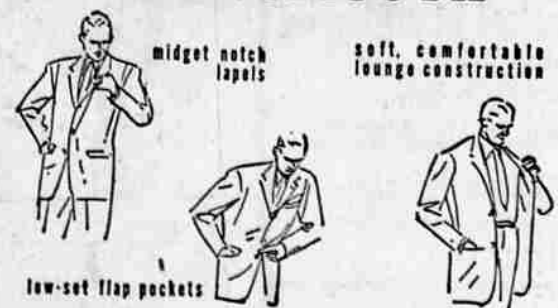
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
