EIGHT NEW LAWS SIGNED BY SNELL

Salem, Ore., Feb. 20.—(U.P.)—Eight new laws were on the books in Oregon today with signature of Gov. Earl Snell after passage by the state legislature. Among them were measures which would change the deadline for filing of candidacies to 84 days before election (instead of the present 45—enabling soldier absentees to vote more easily); make chickens livestock in the legal meaning of the word to protect them from the depredations of dogs; raise the salary of the assistant secretary of state from \$4200 to \$4800, and correct several minor defects in existing laws.
