Labor Saving Equipment Show Set

Approximately 40 different pieces of equipment and exhibits designed to lighten the burden and increase the efficiency of farmers and homemakers will be shown in Jackson county at the Central Point Grange Hall, Thursday, March 1, at 10:00 a. m., according to R. G. Fowler, county agent, who is in charge of arrangements.

One of a series of labor saving demonstrations for the farm and home being shown throughout western Oregon counties, the demonstration will be run continuously from 10 a. m. to 3 p. m.

The demonstration is sponsored by the Oregon State college extension service in cooperation with the county agents' office and local farmers and homemakers. Supplementing equipment shown by the extension service will be pieces of equipment that local people have devised to save time and work. There is a considerable amount of homemade equipment that has been devised by our own farmers that should be included in this demonstration and if any farmer has a piece of equipment which he thinks would be of value to others, he is asked to bring it to the exhibit.

Practically everything to be shown can be made locally, either by the farmer or "man of the house" or by local mechanics. Detailed plans for constructing the equipment will be made available for those wishing them. The demonstration is for women as well as men, and homemaking displays will be of interest to urban as well as rural housewives.

Among the farm equipment to be demonstrated are a manure loader, buck rake, post hole digger, till-top implement trailer, milk cart, motor driven drag saw, improved hay fork and a potato picking belt. A fence post exhibit, showing results of 17 years of experiments with treated fir posts by the O. S. C. school of forestry, and another exhibit on new types of rust-preventive compounds for farm machinery are included. Models of cattle guards and sheep feeding equipment are also included.

Homemakers will see actual-size kitchen sink, kitchen mixing and kitchen storage centers, utility table and lap board, laundry cart, wide ironing board including a demonstration on ironing, food preservation—canning, drying and freezing—demonstrations, how to prepare and pack lunches, sewing aids, including a compact folding sewing kit, exhibit of work clothes for women, a portable wood box and a number of other miscellaneous exhibits of interest to women.

Another Job In a Big Way

About 8000 tons of fresh vegetables are expected to be harvested each month from over 10,000 planted acres on Guam, Españ, and Tinian, the Foreign Economic Administration reports.

Farm projects of this type are set up by FEA wherever the Navy requests such a service. They save shipping tonnage, relieve the drain on native foods, and add variety to the military diet. Technical assistance, tools, seed and farm equipment are provided by the agency. Truck gardens in the South Pacific netted about 5 million pounds of fresh vegetables from July to October, 1944, including cucumbers, watermelons, corn, cantaloupe, radishes, lettuce, potatoes, cabbage and tomatoes. A few crops tried experimentally will be abandoned—turnips are unpopular with the troops; spinach, peas, and string beans take too long to prepare and cook; and Irish potatoes, though

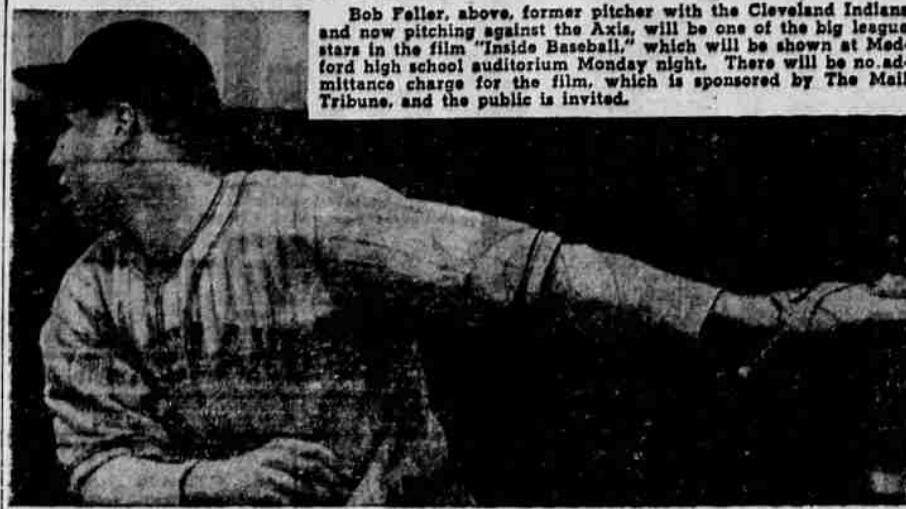

Late Born Stock Best for Show

Pigs and lambs fed as fat stock for the 4-H Auction should be born in March or April of this year.

Indications are that pigs will be rather scarce this year due to a decrease in the number of brood sows kept for farrowing. Any club member who is planning to raise a pig should speak for his animal as soon as he can get one located.

The 4-H Club agent will assist in the location of stock for any club member who desires this help.

Allied Conference To Open April 25 Without Top Hats

San Francisco, Feb. 21—(U.P.)—The United Nations security conference here will open April 25 minus traditional top hats and with little if any social revelry, officials indicated today.

World diplomats from 45 nations will remain here at least three weeks and probably longer, William D. Wright, state department emissary said. And the chances are they will do their work in business suits instead of striped trousers and frock coats.

Mayor Roger Lapham, who doesn't own a top hat, said he hoped people who aren't needed in San Francisco would stay out of town during the conference.

Major Accused Of Killing Secretary

San Francisco, Feb. 21—(U.P.)—Maj. Stanley W. Duncan, 46, today was charged with the fatal stabbing of his red-haired secretary, Mrs. Dorothy Turner Vivell, 36, in his apartment last February 5.

A coroner's jury returned a verdict of murder yesterday. Municipal Judge Leo Cunningham set a preliminary hearing for Friday.

Duncan, dressed in full uniform, was an intent spectator at the inquest. He was accompanied by his wife, Gladys, who flew here from Glendale. She embraced him as they left the court.

San Francisco, Feb. 21—(U.P.)—Maj. Charles Elmer Goode returned here on sick leave from the south Pacific last July to find his wife living with Albert Drager in a house the couple were buying as man and wife. Goode testified yesterday in a divorce action.

Dry Groups All Aglow Over New Midnight Curfew

Washington, Feb. 21—(U.P.)—Cafe society and the boys in the back room may weep at the curfew on night life, but the anti-saloon league and other dry groups said today it was downright wonderful.

Makes for less drinking all around, they said in applauding Mobilization Director James F. Byrnes for ordering bars, theaters and other night spots to shut down at midnight beginning next Monday.

Albany, Feb. 21—(U.P.)—The determination of Gov. Thomas E. Dewey, titular leader of the Republican party, to force legislative approval of an unprecedented anti-discrimination bill was interpreted today as a strong bid for support of liberal voters.

Dewey defied conservative GOP leaders to assume leadership of the fight for enactment of the state measure, which would outlaw discrimination in employment because of race, color, creed or national origin. The bill now is believed to be certain of victory.
