## REVOLUTION SONS PLAN HISTORY OF SOUTHERN OREGON

At the annual meeting of the Southern Oregon Chapter of Sons of the American Revolution held on Washington's Birthday, two matters of special historical interest were considered.

First, the Chapter has been able to secure a photostatic copy of the Original Bill of Rights, recently purchased by Barney Balaban in memory of his father and presented to the Library of Congress in appreciation of the opportunities our nation has afforded him. Until this donation by Mr. Balaban, the Library of Congress has not possessed an original of the Bill of Rights. The photostatic copy just received here will be framed and displayed in one of Medford's public buildings. Later it will be displayed in Grants Pass, Ashland, and Klamath Falls.

The second matter decided upon at the meeting was the appointment of a committee for the immediate undertaking of a program for the compilation of the pioneer history of Southwestern Oregon, particularly that centering around Jackson-

ville, and the recording of it in permanent form. In addition to this work, it is also planned to undertake establishment and maintenance of a museum of pioneer relics which will adequately represent the modes and facilities of living during the pioneer period. The appointed committee in charge is composed of A. E. Voorhies, editor of Grants Pass; Mayor C. A. Meeker, and Walter H. Jones, of Medford.

Officers elected for the ensuing year include: President, A. E. Voorhies; first vice president and registrar, E. M. Hussong; second vice president and secretary-treasurer, Frank L. Muchmore of Medford is retiring president.

Next meeting of the Southern Oregon Chapter S.A.R., will be held on Bunker Hill day, June 17.

No additional details have been received as yet.

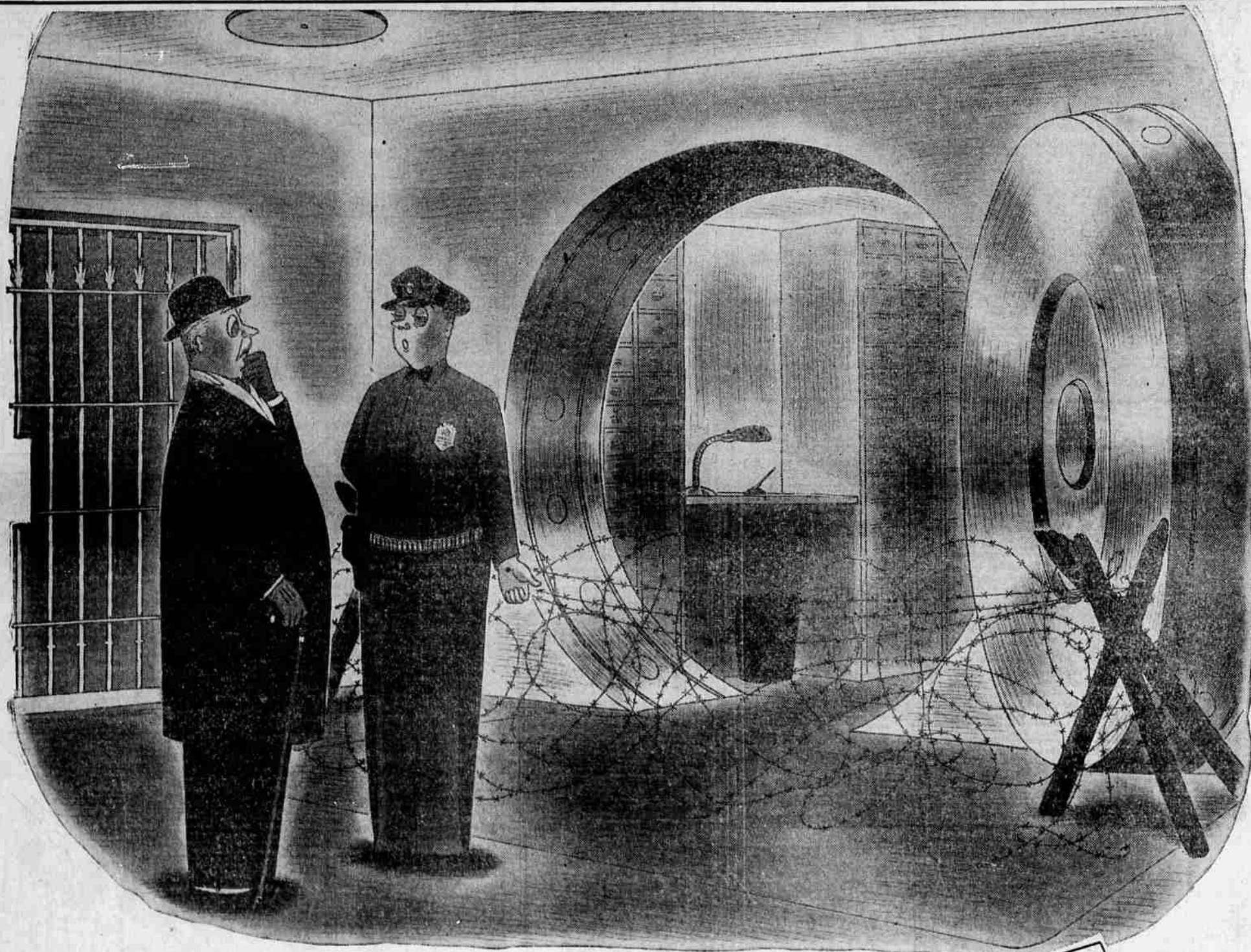
