Without digging up the master copy to show precisely what I said in numerous references to the hospital delivery room I am certain I have not said any such thing here or elsewhere. Had I said what you mean I would have said such a rule is enforced only or used only in shady institutions, not "only used." Moreover I have never argued that anybody's relatives, neighbors or fellow citizens should be present at time of delivery. I have said that in my opinion, and if the patient wishes, her husband should remain with her throughout delivery. And I say here that I doubt the reliability or safety of any hospital or other lying-in institution that excludes or attempts to exclude the husband from the delivery room.

From what I have seen of hospitals, good, bad and indifferent, as medical student, intern, staff physician, patient and visitor, I believe the main reason for the rule excluding the husband from the delivery room is the desire on the part of the people running the institution to avoid lawsuits for malpractice brought by patients or their relatives for grave infractions of asepsis and other sins of carelessness and

neglect committed there. Don't tell me—that it would increase the risk of infection, puerperal infection, if the husband is permitted to be present at the birth. That is absurd, especially in view of the fact that the very institutions excluding the husband so often have whole classes of students—students of nursing, students of medicine—attend the confinement, not to mention assorted practitioners, visiting firemen, superintendents, etcetera, running in and out with supreme contempt for any fool rules. Worse still, no one questions whether the visiting physicians have perchance just come from attendance upon cases of scarlet fever, septic infection, streptococcus sore throat, erysipelas or whatnot. It is left entirely to the individual physician's own conscience, and sometimes the physician's conscience remarkably easy about such things.

PROCESSED FOODS:

Book 4—Blue stamps X5 through B2 valid through March 31. Blue stamps C2 through G2 valid through April 28. Blue stamps H2 through M2 valid through June 2. Blue stamps N2 through S2 valid through March 1 through June 30.

MEAT, BUTTER, CHEESE:

Book 4—Sugar stamp 35 valid through June 2.

SHOES:

Book 3—Airplane stamps 1-2-3 now valid.

GASOLINE: "A" 14 coupons, 4 gal. each, valid through March 21.

FUEL OIL:

Period 1, 2, 3 and 4 coupons valid through August 21. Not more than 66% of season's rations should have been used to date in Roseburg area.

PRICE CONTROL: Refer inquiries and complaints to price clerk at local board.

RENT CONTROL:

In areas under Federal rent control, all rented dwelling units must be registered, and changes in tenancy reported.
