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WAR CASUALTIES INCREASE 11,870 OVER PAST WEEK

Washington, March 2—(U.P.)—American combat casualties announced here today reached a total of 813,032, an increase of 11,870 during the past week.
Secretary of War Henry L. Stimson also revealed that casualties in Italy have crossed the 100,000 mark. From the time of the first landings there on Sept. 9, 1943, he said, there were 19,889 killed, 70,402 wounded, and 10,499 missing, for a total of 100,790. These figures include casualties announced here through Feb. 25.

Army casualties in all theaters as compiled here through Feb. 21 totaled 722,895. These figures, Stimson added, reflected actual fighting through the latter part of January.

This total included 140,366 killed, 430,757 wounded, 60,535 prisoners and 91,037 missing.
A navy list released today showed a total of 90,337 casualties among members of the navy coast guard and marines. The list did not include any casualties suffered by marine forces on Iwo Jima, it was understood, a break-down showed 34,283

dead, 40,904 wounded, 10,674 missing and 4,478 prisoners.
Boys and Girls Given Marijuana Nurse Confesses
Beverly Hills, Cal., March 2 (U.P.)—Confession of a pretty dental nurse that she distributed marijuana to boys and girls at Beverly Hills high school today spurred investigation of a possible widespread school dope ring.
Norma Jean Graybeal, 19, a comely reddish-blond, arrested on suspicion of violating the state poison laws, admitted she distributed marijuana cigarettes to nearly a score of high school boys and girls.
Miss Graybeal obtained her supplies, she said, in Hollywood and from the negro entertainment district on Central avenue where she had once worked.
