**Palestine Sought As Jewish Refuge**  
Washington, March 15—(U.P.)—A delegation which said it represented 5,000 Protestant clergymen today delivered to the White House an appeal that Palestine be opened to the Jews as "a place of refuge and comfort."  
The appeal was presented to Jonathan Daniels, acting press secretary to the president. Similar petitions were delivered later in the day to the British and Soviet embassies for forwarding to Prime Minister Winston Churchill and Marshal Josef Stalin.

**Canol Project To Be Closed April 1**  
Washington, March 15—(U.P.)—The army's Canol project in Canada will be closed April 1, Sen. James M. Mead (D., N. Y.), told the senate today.  
The army began construction of the aviation gasoline project three years ago. Mead's war investigating committee found that it has cost this government \$134,000,000 thus far.  
Mead said 2,000 workers now employed at Canol will be transferred to petroleum fields in this country as soon as possible.

**Russian Pianist Presents Fourth Concert Of Series**

The Jackson County Civic Music association presented the fourth concert of its 1945 series at the high school Tuesday night. The artist, who was most warmly received, was the Russian pianist, Ania Dorfman.  
The program was vital and diversified and there was appeal to individual musical taste and preference. Miss Dorman is endowed by nature and equipped by training with much that is essential to conveying the musical spirit to the public.  
The scope of her program exemplified what piano mastery can be. Our people having heard such outstanding and efficient pianists and musicians on previous concerts of the series, as Leo Taubman, Harry Kaufman, and Carl Fuerstner, serving as accompanists and directors, and many expressing the wish that they might have been heard in a solo piano number, hence it was an eagerly anticipated joy to hear an entire program of pianistic music played by this capable artist.  
She well understands the inherent beauty and emotionalism of music, composed originally for the master instrument, the piano, and its forerunner, the harpsichord. The popularity of Beethoven's 32 sonatas in the studio, concert hall and the home seems to grow greater with the passing of time and Miss Dorfman apparently gave great satisfaction to her audience in her presentation of the No. 11, op 22.  
In an informal chat backstage she admitted that she was proud of the military powers of her native Russia, but was equally proud of our boys as she becomes an American citizen in November.

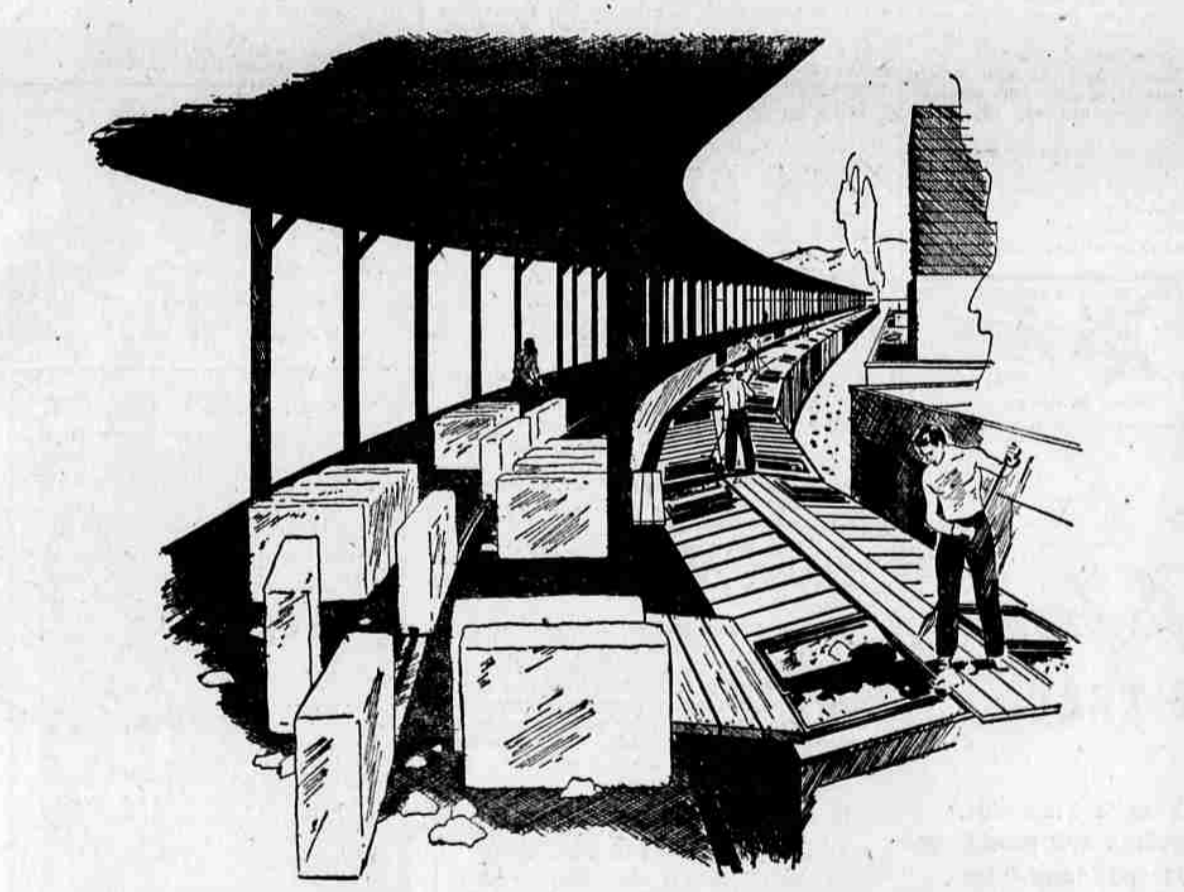
