

JACKSON COUNTY FARM NOTES

Cream Subsidies
Milk and cream subsidy payments for January, February and March are payable beginning April 1. This is a change from last year's procedure when payments were made for two month periods instead of three. Some cream slips for January and February have been received, but cannot be paid until the March slips are available. Copper Wire Tight

Oregon's second quarter copper wire quota for farmstead wiring is 11,900 pounds, 5,000 pounds less than the allocation

for the preceding three months. Since dealers now are unable to obtain wire without an authorized allotment, very little free wire is available, so that the total supply will be considerable less than in the past.

The shorter supply of wire, resulting from increased military demands for copper, will mean that considerably fewer farms can obtain electric hook-ups. Crawlers Still Scarce

Seventy crawler tractors—half of them in the small 18-horsepower size—is Oregon's share of new crawlers for farm use during the second quarter. Applications carried over from the first quarter will more than cover the entire quota.

Waste Fats

Wise use of leftover kitchen fats is the first step in helping to increase collections of used household fats critically needed to make up a deficit in 1945 fat oils supplies.

Farm women and homemakers in small towns have been called upon to contribute a large share of the 250 million pounds of used fats set as this year's goal, and the county extension office is cooperating with local salvage committees in boosting Jackson county's collections.

Rural housewives are now an important source of the estimated potential 500 million pounds of used kitchen fats yearly. Opportunities for salvaging used fats on the farm are now greater than those of city housewives because of home production of meats on the farm and extensive use of poultry and other fat sources.

CEILING PUT ON ALL TYPES HAY

Washington, March 22 — (U.P.)—The Office of Price Administration today set nationwide dollar-and-cent ceiling prices on all types of hay at all levels of distribution.

Previously, only alfalfa hay was under price control.

Prices, OPA said, will reflect parity to producers and become effective May 1. On Jan. 15, parity on all types of hay was \$20.40 per ton.

WEATHER SLOWS SPRING PLANTING

Present weather conditions are retarding the spring seeding work and delaying pear and peach bud development. Frost Observer Roy Rogers reports pear development about a week behind last year at this time. He explained the delay was beneficial, and a few warm days would cause rapid advancement. Peach orchardists estimate the fruit about 10 days behind last year.

Other farm work, as well as seeding, has been delayed. County Agent Robert G. Fowler reported.

Observer Rogers reported he had completed the testing of all orchard thermometers turned in, and requested orchardists to come and get them any time.

DOCTORS ASKED TO USE CAUTION WITH SYPHILIS

Chicago, March 22.—(U.P.)—Physicians were advised today to use caution in diagnosing syphilis in persons who have had malaria, because the disease often results in false positive tests.

Three army doctors, writing in the journal of the American Medical association, said that "a diagnosis of syphilis on a patient who is infected with malaria, may produce greater disaster than the actual disease itself."
