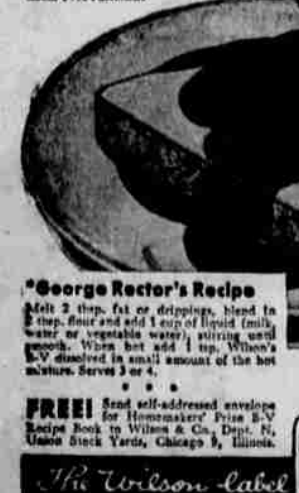

BALL PLAYERS TO LEAVE WAR JOBS

Washington, March 22.—(U.P.)—Assurance that the government will not challenge their patriotism if they leave war jobs to play professional baseball was expected today to bring a host of top stars back to the game.

The most encouraging aspect of the latest "green light" from the administration was that War Manpower Commissioner Paul V. McNutt went out of his way to praise the sport when he ruled that players in war jobs during the off-season could return to baseball without fear of being drafted as job jumpers.

It was emphasized that McNutt's ruling will not keep a player from being drafted if he is physically able to go into military service. Thus physically fit men in war plants who hold deferments because of dependency could not return to baseball without taking their chances in the regular processes of the military draft.

NELSON EDGES SNEAD IN CHARLOTTE OPEN

Charlotte, N. C., March 22.—(U.P.)—Byron Nelson, who had begun to wonder if his efforts to take first money in the Charlotte golf open wasn't like chasing the pot of gold at the foot of the rainbow, pocketed the \$2,000 prize today after two extra 18-hole playoffs with Sammy Sneed.

The triumph came yesterday when he shot a three-under-par 69, while Sneed, his lame back aching from the six-day grind, took a 73.

Negro WACs Given One Year Sentence

Fort Devons, Mass., March 22.—(U.P.)—Four Negro WACs were under court-martial sentence of one year at hard labor and dishonorable discharge today because they defied a general.

The decision was returned last night by a nine-member court-martial which included two Negro officers, but it is subject to review by higher army officials. The Negroes staged a sit-down strike at Lovell General hospital here March 10 and then defied Maj. Gen. Sherman Miles' back-to-work order.

BOYS ADMIT BURNING INFANT IN CARRIAGE

Cambridge, Mass., March 22.—(U.P.)—Police had the confession today of four boys that they set fire to the carriage of 6-month-old John Otis, who died of burns.

The boys, ranging in age from 9 to 12, said they tried to put out the fire but became frightened and fled. They had been throwing matches at pedestrians yesterday before they set the baby's carriage on fire.

BENICIA HAS BLAZE

Benicia, Calif., March 22.—(U.P.)—Fire of unknown origin early today destroyed a half-block of business buildings, including two historical landmarks, and for a while threatened the Benicia city hall until it was brought under control. No deaths or injuries were reported. The blaze started about 1:30 a. m. in the old brewery building and raged for an hour and a half.

OFF-WED WOMAN GETS CONTINUANCE ON FRAUD CHARGE

Sacramento, March 22.—(U.P.)—Mrs. Vilma Suberly, pretty 26-year-old blonde, who is alleged to have eight husbands, yesterday won a continuance until next Monday or her arraignment on charges of collecting allotment checks from several of her servicemen spouses.

Clothed in a modish fur coat and with a wide smile, Mrs. Suberly arrived here Monday night in custody of a U. S. marshal from Portland, Ore., to answer a charge of mail fraud in connection with cashing one of the allotment checks here.

Smile Sags

Yesterday, as she stood before District Federal Judge Martin L. Welsh, the fur coat still was fetching, but the smile sagged at the corners. When Judge Welsh granted her attorney's plea for more time because Mrs. Suberly was new in town, the smile perked up again, and she was taken, gay and chatting, back to jail.

Mrs. Suberly entertained the press at the county jail.

"I certainly was not married when I was 10 years old," she declared. "I was almost 12."

Mrs. Suberly was arrested at Eugene, Ore., her mother's home, in January by the FBI on charges of falsely obtaining \$4,800 in dependent's allotments. Oregon has nice weather, she said, and she's going back as soon "as I'm turned loose."

DROP IN EGG PRICES LOWERS LIVING COSTS

Washington, March 22.—(U.P.)—A seasonal drop in egg prices sent the cost of living down two tenths of one per cent in the month ending Feb. 15. Secretary of Labor Frances Perkins reported today.

Miss Perkins said egg prices went down 9.7 per cent during the month, contributing to a drop of six tenths of one per cent in average food prices.

DAMAGES SOUGHT FOR AUTO WRECK

Mrs. Billie R. Skeeters, in a personal damage action filed against Fred Svinth and Harold Swanson, seeks \$5000 damages for injuries sustained in an auto-truck collision on the Crater Lake highway near Prospect January 22, 1944. Her husband, Everett Skeeters, asks \$1,852.58 from the same defendants for loss of the auto and its use. All parties in the litigation are residents of the Prospect section.

The complaint of Mrs. Skeeters sets forth that about 9:30 p. m. January 22, 1944, a truck driven by Swanson, an employee of Svinth, struck the Skeeters auto and wrecked it, causing injuries to her. She alleges the truck, loaded with ties, exceeded the legal width limit and that the truck was operated negligently and at excessive speed.

Skeeters asserts that the auto, used by him in his logging business, had a value of \$1,800 before the crash and that afterwards it had a value of only \$47. He asks \$1800 for the auto, and
