GRAND JURY IS TO HEAR CASES

The grand jury, Victor Bursell, Central Point, foreman, assembled this morning for investigation of a number of pending criminal matters including the case of Fred Wolf, charged with the knife slaying early last February of Percy H. James, as the climax of a sidewalk brawl at Gold Hill. Three Gold Hill residents and two police officers have been summoned as witnesses. The district attorney's office anticipated the session would be brief.

The petit jury is not expected to be called for some time for trial duty. Circuit Judge Herbert K. Hanna will be busy most of the coming month attending to the mass of routine matters which accumulated during his illness. Until the return of County Judge Coleman, expected the middle of April, Judge Hanna has the added duties of the probate and juvenile courts.

GRANDSON KILLED IN LUZON, WOMAN HEARS

Prospect, March 23 — Second Lieutenant William O. Goodlow was killed in action, Jan. 8, over Luzon, according to official word received here by his grandmother, Mrs. Ed Hollenbeak, who previously had been informed that he was missing in action. Lieut. Goodlow was co-pilot on a B-24 bomber on a mission over Luzon and, according to information received, the plane was damaged by flak. Eight of the ten members of the crew were seen to parachute from the flaming plane, which went into a shallow dive and crashed. It is presumed that some of the crew members have rejoined American forces on Luzon, and brought word that Goodlow was not among the eight men who escaped. Lieut. Goodlow's wife, the former Lucia Britton of Roseburg, is now serving as a corporal in the Women's Reserve of the U. S. Marine Corps. His mother, Mrs. Florence Goodlow, of Roseburg, spent several days here at the Hollenbeak home, after receiving the word of her son's death.

Japs Optimistic Since New Diet, Despite Losses

Premier Kuniaki Koiso of Japan told the Diet's House of Representatives Thursday that, in effect, nothing succeeds like failure.

Tokyo radio, in a broadcast recorded by United Press at San Francisco quoted Koiso as saying: "The mental outlook of the entire Japanese nation has changed from one of stalemate to bright optimism since the formation of my cabinet."

Since Koiso took over from Premier Hideki Tojo last July, United States forces have recaptured the Philippines; successfully invaded Peleliu in the Palaus and Iwo Jima in the volcanic islands, only 750 miles from Tokyo; reduced Japan to a third-rate naval power; sent B-29's and carrier planes over the enemy homeland.

War Workers Seek Equal Rights For Reconversion Era

Chicago, March 23 — (U.P.) — Veterans of the production front today were forming a national organization to seek "equal rights with war veterans" in the reconversion period.

Chartered as the War Veterans League of America, the organization is planning to champion a "bill of rights for war workers," National Superintendent George M. Hodge said today. The league also hopes to concern itself with other sections matters, such as full employment and disability insurance, Hodge said. But, he added, like existing service veterans organizations, it plans to have some fun, too.

"Our organization is going to be a workers' American Legion," Hodge said. "We are going to join the ranks of post-war veterans parades as well as form a lobby in Washington to get legislation benefitting workers."
