### Allied Boats Hit German Positions

Rome, March 29—(U.P.)—Allied warships bombarded German positions for four days in northern Italy along the long-dormant Franco-Italian frontier, it was disclosed today.

## HARRY CHIPMAN MADE CHAIRMAN OF KOG PROGRAM

Governor Earl Snell this week announced the appointment of Harry Chipman, of Ashland to serve during 1945 as Jackson county chairman of Keep Oregon Green, and has asked the new chairman to select at once a steering committee of citizens to work with him in the all important work of preventing farm and forest fires this year.

"As the war draws to a close," Governor Snell stated, "we can expect desperate last minute efforts by the Japanese to wreck their spite on us. Such fiendishness might take the form of incendiary attacks on our forests. We must be ever on the alert to make certain that such attacks fail."

Governor Snell pointed out that during the 1945 summer season and even now, it is the duty of every citizen to take an active part in the publicly-sponsored Keep Oregon Green program, and see that man-caused fires just do not get started.

Charles Ogle, newly named executive secretary, stated at Salem headquarters of KOG this week that he would very shortly start on a tour of the state to work out local fire prevention programs with each county committee.

## MAYOR IS KILLED BY UNDERGROUND

London, March 29—(U.P.)—Radio Berlin made its first claim today that the Nazi underground operations have begun in Germany when it said that "freedom fighters" had condemned and killed the mayor of Aachen.

The incident was considered so important that the big Berlin station Deutschlandsender broke into a musical program to announce it.

Allied front dispatches two days ago said the mayor of Aachen, Franz Oppenhoff, 41, who was considered an anti-Nazi, was slain by three uniformed German soldiers on the back porch of his home. The assassins escaped.

### Accidents Fewer Than Last Year

Chicago, March 29—(U.P.)—Six per cent fewer Americans lost their lives in traffic accidents during January and February than in the same two months last year, the National Safety Council reported today.

The decrease, however, had nothing to do with a widespread notion of lessened travel, the council added. As a matter of fact, it cited reports of increased gasoline usage to show that the decrease in deaths was in spite of, rather than the result of, the wartime travel situation.

### RING OF NAZI CURRENCY SMUGGLERS BROKEN UP

Stockholm, March 29—(U.P.)—The Swedish newspaper Aftonbladet reported today that Swedish police had broken up a big gang of German currency smugglers. The smugglers included members of the German legation in Stockholm.

Tens of millions of kroner (a krone is worth about 45 cents) have been smuggled into Sweden by the gang, headed by a Gestapo official named Finka, the newspaper said.
