Washington, March 31 — (U.P.) The office of price administration today extended shoe rationing to include infants' shoes sizes 0 to 4. Previously only in-

fant's shoes size 4 1/2 to 8 were rationed.

The enormous increase in express shipments of late totaling 200,000,000 a year, of which 70 per cent is war traffic, requires the services of 77,000 men and women.
