Newspapers Depended On For Seventh War Loan Campaign

New York, April 2.—(U.P.)—The treasury will depend heavily on newspaper publicity and special advertising by users of newspaper space to put over the \$14,000,000,000 seventh war loan, Ted R. Gamble, director of the treasury's war finance division, said today.

Predicting that individual income will be higher during the seventh war loan than during any previous drive period, Gamble called on individuals to subscribe \$7,000,000,000, or half the campaign's quota. In the sixth war loan the individual quota was \$5,000,000,000.

"The \$4,000,000,000 goal for E bond sales alone," he told the New York financial advertisers, "is the highest such figure of any drive and is \$1,500,000,000 more than E bond quota in the sixth."

He disclosed that from May 1, 1941, to January 1, 1945, individuals had bought \$42,000,000,000 in government securities and in the same period had redeemed less than 13 per cent of these obligations. The treasury in that period sold to all types of investors some \$177,000,000,000 in securities.

New York, March 31.—(U.P.)—The American Newspaper Publishers association reported today that daily and Sunday papers published 1,555,945 individual advertisements valued at \$49,520,098 in support of war projects during 1944.

The report was made in "Democracy's Indispensable Homefront Weapon," a booklet published by the A. N. P. A.'s bureau of advertising. The advertisements aggregated the equivalent of 116,111 standard-size full pages—enough to fill a 24-page paper with nothing but war-theme advertising every day for 18 years. The advertising does not include any space given the war effort in weekly papers.

Leading war projects and the value of the advertising space

devoted to them were: War bonds, \$23,117,018; Red Cross, \$2,927,012; waste paper salvage, \$2,840,044, of which \$1,271,039 represented space donated by newspapers, the national war fund, \$2,359,427; "don't telephone," \$2,223,129, and armed forces recruiting, \$2,149,929.

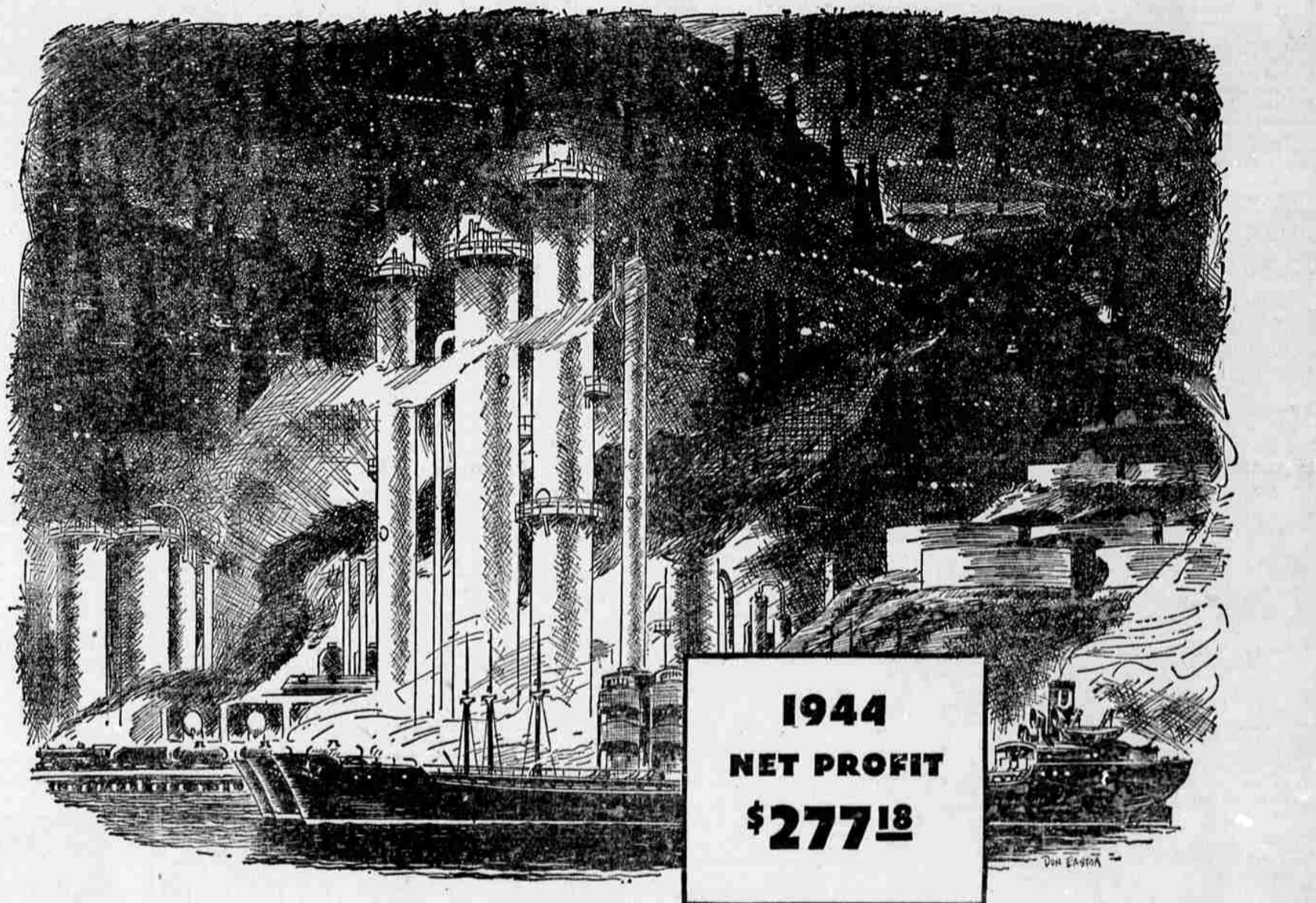
