## AUTHOR ATTACKS ADVICE GIVEN TO SERVICE WIVES

Baltimore, Md. (U.P.)—Soldiers' wives who absorb all the "bunk" being written on "how to handle the returning veteran" should have their heads examined, says Faith Baldwin, author of books on love, marriage and the American home.

She made the statement during a visit here. Miss Baldwin advocates a normal approach to the reunion of the soldier and his wife. "If there is anything about a marriage," she says, "the couple should be able to pick up from where they left off and continue from there. If they really love each other this can be done."

Emphasizing her attitude towards all the advice being circulated on what to do about the returning soldier, Miss Baldwin added, "if the wives absorb all the talk and reading that's being circulated, psychiatrists had better come in and examine them. They will need the examination more than the veterans. People who circulate all these ideas about adjustments after the war evidently are trying to scare us, not only the wives but the mothers, too."

Miss Baldwin admitted that it isn't possible to lay down a blanket rule for every couple. She expressed her belief however, that most returning soldier will adjust to civilian life satisfactorily.

## Texas Weed May Provide Perfume For New Industry

College Station, Tex. (U.P.)—The people of East Texas have been turning up their noses for years at their annual bumper, but unwelcome, crops of goldenrod, horsemint and mountain mintweed.  
 "Just plain old weeds," they said. "Wish we could get rid of them."  
 But now science has discovered that those weeds have possibilities in the creation of a new and lucrative industry for East Texas—a perfume industry.

Experiments under way at Texas A. and M. College experimental stations, it is revealed, have shown that the weeds can be treated chemically to produce precious perfume oils.  
 Texas A. and M. says further study is necessary before the commercial value of the plants as perfume producers will be finally ascertained, but that East Texas farmers may find a lot of revenue in their weed patches before long.
