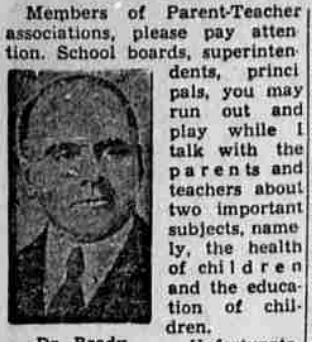

WHEN JOHNNY COMES MARCHING HOME



Members of Parent-Teacher associations, please pay attention. School boards, superintendents, principals, you may run out and play while I talk with the parents and teachers about two important subjects, namely, the health of children and the education of children.

Dr. Brady Unfortunately the apportionment of tax funds to the schools, at least in some states or provinces, depends on the attendance record of the school or schools in the district. Therefore school boards, superintendents, principals, and sometimes even teachers who hope to curry favor with their superiors, urge pupils to come to school no matter if they have a mere "cold," and not spoil the school's or schoolroom's high attendance record.

Now this is vicious practice, of course. It contributes to the spread of several epidemic diseases which so commonly pass (and pass it right) in the earlier stage as "a cold," such diseases, stupid, as diphtheria, scarlet fever, measles, infantile paralysis—and neither health officer nor practicing physician will deny this.

But the practice is shortsighted from the schoolboard's, superintendent's or principal's point of view, for the child who comes to school in spite of an alleged "mere cold" is likely to share his or her infection with several other children who happen to be within conversational spray range—don't be deceived by the hackneyed advice to cover coughs and sneezes, for polite conversation carries germ or virus laden spray just as coughing or sneezing does, only the conversational spray range is not so great, less than five feet. The consequence is that, instead of one pupil being absent from school one or two or three days, several pupils will be absent for one or two or three days each. It piles up.

And you parents and teachers must be blamed for entrusting the school or schools in the district to the management of such ignorant people.

When Johnny comes marching home with a note from teacher

or nurse explaining that he had better not attend school on account of running nose, cough, sneezing, sniffing, or whatever sign of some developing illness or indisposition Johnny presents, don't show your ignorance by resenting it, but thank your lucky stars your school is in charge of an alert teacher, nurse, physician, health officer or whoever it may be that spots John's innocent plan to sabotage the school's health and attendance record.

If Johnny's indisposition proves trivial and he enjoys every minute of the freedom from school, that makes no difference at all. I say you should be glad your Johnny is privileged to attend such a well managed school.

ELECTRIC GADGETS AVAILABLE SOON AFTER WAR ENDS

War Production Chief Says Refrigerators, Radios, Washers at Pre-War Level in Year.

Washington, April 4.—(U.P.)—Almost all types of consumer goods will return to the market in the year after Germany's defeat, and the rate of civilian production will reach pre-war levels at the end of 12 months, War Production Chief J. A. Krug predicted today.

That would mean, he told a press conference, that Americans will have a chance to buy such items as mechanical refrigerators, radios, domestic washing machines, and possibly automobiles within a year after V-E day.

These and other items have virtually disappeared from the American market. Most of them have not been produced for civilian purposes since Pearl Harbor.

The WPB chairman announced that there would be a 12 per cent cut in the output of munitions during the three-month period following the fall of Germany, thereby confirming a United Press report to this effect last week.

This cutback, he said, would go up to 35 per cent after a year of fighting a one-front war in the Pacific.

To Release Steel

Other V-E day adjustments will release at least 1,500,000 tons of steel and an even greater quantity of aluminum for civilian use during the first three months. The amount of these metals available for civilian production will increase during subsequent periods, he explained.

Some materials, such as tin, crude rubber, textiles, lumber, and certain chemicals will continue to be scarce after V-E day, Krug said it will be necessary to "steer clear" of some of these materials in returning to civilian production.

THIRTEEN CASES WHOOPING COUGH

Weekly report of the county health officer, Dr. A. Erin Merkel, shows 13 cases of whooping cough and nine cases of chickenpox listed for the week ending April 30. The whooping cough is in scattered areas, seven cases being reported from Gold Hill, three from Rogue River and three from Lake Creek. The chickenpox was reported from Ashland, Jacksonville, Talent and Phoenix.

Also listed were three cases of diphtheria, one in Central Point and two in Medford; five cases of measles and three of mumps. The measles were reported from Medford and Rogue River and mumps from Medford.

Hollywood Police Round Up Makers Of Lewd Pictures

Hollywood, April 4.—(U.P.)—Fifteen raids were staged today by FBI agents and police today in a wholesale roundup of a ring involved in making and distributing lewd movies and still pictures.

The district attorney's office confiscated 30 reels of motion picture film, hundreds of still photographs and projection and photographic equipment.

Among those arrested was Aileen Stockweather, 16-year-old from Kansas City, Mo., who tipped off police on the activities of the group.

Others in custody were Ken Bishop, 35, the "casting director," Henry C. Seelander, who operated the studio; Frank Ries, 38, cameraman; D. R. "Doc" Taylor, the male "star," and Sunny Andre, 21, beautiful blonde model.

Officers said that two huge dogs were guarding the equipment and pictures at Taylor's home.
