Bowron Retained As Los A. Mayor

Los Angeles, April 5—(U.P.)—Mayor Fletcher Bowron was assured of another four years in office today and an \$8,000 pay raise to boot.

Incomplete returns from more than half the city's 3,027 precincts gave Bowron an almost 3 to 1 majority over his closest opponent. Tabulations gave Bowron approximately 40,000 more votes than any of the 12 other contenders, eliminating necessity of a run-off election.

A slow second was Cafeteria Owner Clifford Clinton, at one time the mayor's chief political backer who conceded his defeat in a message pledging to "continue to help make Los Angeles a finer city."

Commodity Credit Extension Voted

Washington, April 5—(U.P.)—The Senate today passed and sent to the White House a bill to extend the life of the Commodity Credit Corp., to June 30, 1947, and to raise its borrowing power to \$4,750,000,000. The CCC is the agency that pays most of the food subsidies.

Passage was on a party-line vote of 46 to 32.

Heiress, Director Romancing, Claim

New York, April 5—(U.P.)—The New York Daily News said today that Gloria Vanderbilt De Cicco and Leopold Stokowski, conductor, may meet in Mexico to get married as soon as Mrs. De Cicco is divorced.

The newspaper quoted friends of Mrs. De Cicco as saying that nightly phone calls between Reno and New York have been held since the 21-year-old \$4,500,000 heiress left here early in March for Reno.

Stokowski was not available for comment.

ADAIR RECEIVES NAVAL WOUNDED

Camp Adair, Ore., April 5.—(U.P.)—The U. S. naval hospital here received 230 wounded men from the South Pacific on Easter Sunday, it was revealed today by Cmdr. E. P. Harris, public relations officer of the hospital.

The men, most of whom will require long hospitalization for shrapnel and other wounds, are "in good spirits and very happy to be back home," Cmdr. Harris said.

A number of the men will be moved to naval hospitals nearer their homes when they are better able to travel.

Bob C. Reynolds Sees Flag Raised On Iwo Jima Isle

Bob C. Reynolds, SK 3/c, recently wrote to his parents, Mr and Mrs. C. R. Reynolds, 36 North Peach street, telling that he was in the operation on Iwo Jima and saw the flag raised on "hot rock". It was a glorious feeling, Reynolds wrote, after seeing wounded marines brought aboard his ship.

Reynolds graduated from Medford high school and attended Sacramento Junior college one and one-half years. Before entering the service he served for two years with the army engineers in Alaska.

Another son, Pfc. Lee Reynolds, is still in a base hospital in the Pacific area. He was wounded January 23 on Luzon.

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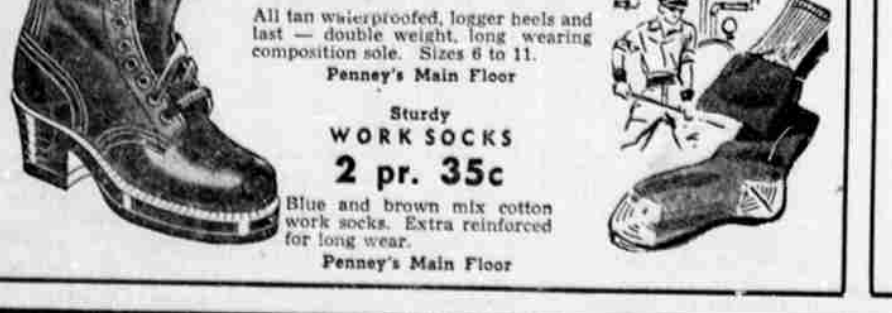
