

Wally Moss Will Handle Belcastro-Mask Ring Go

Wally Moss, Klamath Falls, one of the outstanding wrestling referees on the coast and former light heavyweight boxing champion of the navy, will be third man in the ring tonight when Pete Belcastro and the Gray Mask clash in their finish match at Medford armory. They will go until one has won two falls, with no time limit.

Moss was brought here for the match because Belcastro refused to enter the ring with Earl Yoakley as referee. He felt he was given a raw deal last week when he was giving the Mask a sound thrashing, only to have Yoakley disqualify him. They tangled in the dressing room after the match, with the Mask joining in, but the fight

was broken up by other wrestlers. This will be the fourth time these ring enemies have met in Medford. The first two ended in draws with the Mask winning the other on a foul.

Advance ticket sales point to a record house, Promoter Mack Lillard said this morning. Several choice seats are expected to be offered at the gate tonight.

The semi-windup is drawing considerable interest from lovers of fast and scientific grappling. Ernie Piluso of Portland and Georges Dussette, junior heavyweight champion of the coast, will clash in the four round bout.

Tex Hager, short but capable speed merchant, will tangle with kidney-punching Billy McEuln in the 8:30 opener. They are down for three rounds.

PORTLAND EDGES SACRAMENTO FOR LEAD IN LEAGUE

Pacific Coast league baseball teams swung into the second series of games of the 1945 season yesterday with the Portland Beavers rising early in the race to the leadership.

The Beavers trimmed the Sacramento Solons 5-4. The Los Angeles Angels outslugged the Seattle Rainiers, 8-5, putting both teams in a second-place tie. The Oakland Oaks downed the Hollywood Stars 5-3 and the San Diego Padres defeated the San Francisco Seals 5-2.

Tied three all at the end of the seventh, the Beavers went to work in the eighth, pounding the Solon's Gene Babbitt for a single and a double and then sending across the winning run on Babbitt's balk. Sacramento also scored in its share of the eighth. Ad Liska, who pitched the entire route, was credited with the win.

Cochran Narrows Billiard Margin
Cleveland, April 5—(U.P.)—Champion Welker Cochran of San Francisco, with two straight victories, reduced Willie Hoppe's lead in the cross-country three cushion billiard title match to 90 points today.

Cochran won the opening block yesterday, 60 to 57, in 48 innings with a high run of nine, then took the night block, 60 to 54, in 44 innings, running four straight. Hoppe's high run was five in both blocks.

University of Oregon, Eugene, April 5 (Special)—Walter Graham of Ashland, sophomore in liberal arts, has been announced as winner of first prize in the Marshall-Case-Haycox short-story contest by W. F. G. Thacher, professor of English. Graham will receive \$50 for his story, "Return."

Second place and an award of \$30 was won by Robert McGill of Eugene, junior in liberal arts, for "Night Nurse." Third prize of \$20 was awarded to Jean Lawrence of Portland, sophomore in journalism, for "Guilty."

The contest is sponsored annually by three alumni of the university, Edison Marshall, 1917; Robert Ormond Case, 1920, and Ernest J. Haycox, 1923. Contestants are limited to undergraduates regularly enrolled and in good standing.

Albany to Have Poultry Cannery To Cost \$27,500
Albany, April 5—Plans for construction of a poultry cannery whose production capacity will equal approximately the entire annual output of turkeys in the Albany territory were submitted Wednesday night to contractors at Albany and Portland by C. R. Ashton, who will construct housing for a plant to be installed here by Swift & Co.

The building will be of reinforced concrete. The estimated cost, exclusive of machinery and equipment, is \$27,500. Completion is scheduled for early June.

Atlanta, Ga., April 5—(U.P.)—It's get-away day today on the professional golfing circuit and the rest of the field will have its last chance of the season to break up the Byron Nelson-Sammy Snead monopoly in the \$10,000 Atlanta iron lung tournament.

A field of 80 odd pros and amateurs was entered and the early hope of the long-shot fans was Jimmy Demaret, the Texas sailor on navy leave who has been playing in practice rounds as if he had never heard of either Nelson or Snead.

Nevertheless, Nelson, the Toledo, O., veteran and Snead, the West Virginian who served a hitch in the navy himself, are the one-two favorites. Nelson is going after his eighth tournament victory of the winter season and Snead is seeking his seventh.
