

## JACKSON COUNTY SALVAGE EFFORT WINS K. F. SPUDS

Robert Duff, Jackson county salvage chairman, and his committee, are awaiting shipment of a 100-pound sack of Klamath No. 1 Netted Gem potatoes as a result of the recent tin can salvage drive.

Paul Lee, chairman of the Klamath county salvage committee recently offered to bet a sack of potatoes against a similar amount of Medford peaches that Klamath county would collect more tin.

The challenge was promptly accepted by Duff who is now awaiting delivery of the potatoes. School children of Jackson county collected 45,000 pounds of tin in the recent drive, as compared to better than 30,000 pounds collected in Klamath county.

Duff again urged all people to save tin and waste paper. He said permanent depots would be established throughout the city as soon as plans can be worked out. The Boy Scouts, Duff said, will conduct a paper drive later in the month.

## INJUNCTION SUIT FILED IN COURT

A suit in equity for an injunction and other relief was filed yesterday in circuit court by Alex G. Hays against Mr. and Mrs. J. W. McCulley and Mr. and Mrs. W. G. Beard. It involves orchard and fruit land in the Coker Butte area.

Hays sets forth that he leased the land, including 11 acres of orchard and hay and grain acreage to the defendants in September 1944 on a share rental basis. He alleges that in February of this year, in pruning the orchard much fruit producing wood was cut away, reducing value of the crop from \$8000 to \$2000. He further alleges that last March he was evicted from the land by the defendants and denied ingress and egress to the property.

Hays asks for possession of the land and right of ingress and egress and a decree to that effect. If these are denied, damages from the McCulleys of \$6,000 and from the Beards of \$3,000 is sought. Hays estimates the value of this season's fruit and farm crop at \$9500. The plaintiff is represented by Attorney G. M. Roberts.

## NEW LINOLEUM BEING LAID IN COURT HOUSE

Laying of new linoleum in all offices and departments of the county court house has started. Installation of sound deadening material on the ceilings of the building was completed today. The job has eliminated much of the reverberations in the halls and offices and noise from clattering typewriters and slamming doors is now reduced. The linoleum laying is expected to take a month.

Aboard Hospital Ship U.S.S. Hope, March 15—(Delayed)—(U.P.)—Take it from the dentists aboard the hospital ships in the forward Pacific areas, dental patients out here don't act the way most of them did in peacetime. They have lost their fear of the drill and other gleaming dental instruments.

"Our patients seem to have a completely different attitude toward dentists," Capt. Ira Kaminsky, 32, Newark, N. J., said. "In peacetime about fifty per cent of my patients asked for anesthesia for fillings, but none of the boys here bother."

**Hangman of Poles Captured by Reds**  
London, April 5—(U.P.)—The Soviet War News, published by the soviet embassy in London, reported today that the Red Army has captured "the hangman of the Polish people."

The newspaper described him as "Gaulleiter Greiser" and said he was captured in Poznan.

The publication said Greiser's crime was his mass execution of 100 political prisoners in Zgierz in 1942 in retaliation for the slaying of two Gestapo men by a Polish army sergeant.
