

CURFEW CHANGE TOLD IN LETTER TO LAW OFFICERS

Pursuant to instructions from the state war manpower director in Portland, Lewis Ulrich, manager of the U. S. employment service here Saturday mailed copies of the following letter to all law enforcement agencies in Jackson county:

"The purpose of this letter is to clarify the Byrnes midnight curfew order.

"The principal change is that all restaurants which, prior to February 19, 1945, had not remained open 24 hours a day are to close by midnight until and unless an exemption from this ruling can be obtained from the state manpower director. Requests for such exemptions must be filed in accordance with these regulations with the state manpower director at Portland, Ore., through the local office of the United States employment service.

"All persons are to be out of the establishment promptly by midnight, including bartenders, cooks, bus boys, waiters, waitresses and attendants, excepting only such workers as are customarily employed after closing time for protective and maintenance purposes.

"No establishment listed as affected by the midnight curfew order may evade the intent and purpose of the order by closing off any part of the building occupied by the establishment as a means to change the establishment's accepted classification. For example, a night club may not close that portion of the building used for dancing and entertainment purposes in order to operate another part of the building as a restaurant.

"The serving of alcoholic beverages and the operation of all entertainment devices and programs which are to cease at midnight may not be resumed before 7 a. m.

Mr. and Mrs. John Ehrk, 1134 Court street, have received word from the war department that their son, Pfc. Keith C. Ehrk, was killed in action somewhere in Germany March 22.

He was born Feb. 14, 1924, at Huron, S. D., and at the age of 12 moved to Medford with his parents. He attended Medford schools and graduated with the class of 1943.

On August 2, 1943, he entered the army ground forces and took his training at Fort Riley, Kans., and Camp Campbell, Ky. In October, 1944, he sailed for France where he spent six months with Gen. Patch's 7th army.

Surviving are his parents and a brother, Lloyd, now serving with the army ground forces somewhere in the Philippines, and other relatives.

OREGON CONGRESS OF P.-T. A. TO HOLD ASHLAND MEETING

One-Day District Conference Slated for Presbyterian Church On April 17th

Ashland, April 9.—The Oregon Congress of Parents and Teachers will hold a one-day district conference at the Presbyterian church in Ashland on April 17, according to a press release by Mrs. John B. White of Portland. Faced with the problem of providing instruction in organization procedures for new officers, advancing the program of parent education and of conducting an election despite the rulings made by the Office of War Transportation regarding conventions, the Oregon Congress has planned a series of one-day mid-week meetings throughout the state. Program material for all six meetings will be the same though different speakers will be used in some instances.

Program Planned

The program for the Ashland meeting, planned to serve the southwestern part of the state, will begin at 10 a. m. with a community sing followed by invocation. At 10:20 Mrs. Katherine Read, head of the nursery schools, Oregon State college, will speak on "A Changing Family in a Changing World." This will be followed at 11:15 a. m. with "Leadership From the Ranks" by Mrs. O. C. Ufford Fort Collins, Colo., a regional vice president of the National Congress of Parents and Teachers.

At noon there will be a luncheon meeting at which Mrs. Harry H. George, president of the Oregon Congress, will speak. Introduction of committees will take place at 2 o'clock and at 2:20 p. m. M. B. Winslow of Ashland will speak on "Looking Ahead to Education." At 3:10 Mrs. Mel Hogan of Medford, representing the League of Women Voters, will speak on "The People's Peace." Summary and adjournment will take place at 4 p. m.

Mrs. Ufford Active

The congress is especially fortunate in having Mrs. Ufford in the state for the entire program. She has been active in the Parent-Teacher organization since 1922. Her services have included most of the offices and chairmanships of local, county, district and state levels and she has recently finished a term as president of the Colorado Congress.

Mrs. George is completing the first year of her three-year term as state president. She also serves as chairman of the Portland school board. During the recent session of the state legislature she, with Mrs. Frederick Young, legislative chairman, gave active support to the education and child welfare bills approved by the board of managers.

A place has been given on each conference program to the "People's Peace" because the National Congress has previously gone on record as favoring the Dumbarton Oaks plan. A recent news release from the National Congress announced that the group is supporting the Bretton Woods proposals for an international bank for reconstruction and development.

Vote By Mail

Machinery has been set up for conducting the election by mail, so there will be no business session at the conference. Ballots have been sent out and must be returned by April 20.

Local arrangements are in the hands of regional vice presidents, county and city council presidents. Mrs. H. C. Obye,

Grants Pass, is vice president of region eight. County council presidents are Mrs. H. O. Colburn, Medford, Jackson county; Mrs. W. R. Harper, Grants Pass, Josephine county; Mrs. Frank Peyton, Klamath Falls, Klamath county; Mrs. C. L. Wolff is president of the Ashland city council, the host organization. The meetings are open to anyone interested. There will be a 25c registration fee for each person attending.
