Coast Grid League To Have 10 Teams

Sacramento, April 10—(U.P.)—President J. Rufus Klawans announced today that the Pacific Coast Professional Football League will be composed of 10 teams next fall, one more than last season.

Paul Schissler, recently released from active army duty, owns a franchise which will be established at Sacramento, Fresno, Spokane or Tacoma.

Other League teams are at Oakland, San Jose, Los Angeles, Hollywood, San Diego, Portland, Seattle and two at San Francisco.

TED CRAMER DIES ON EVE OF RETURN TO G. P. POSITION

Corvallis, Ore., April 10—(U.P.)—Theodore P. (Ted) Cramer, 50, Oregon State College business manager since 1940, and former member of the state legislature, died unexpectedly last night.

Cramer came to Corvallis five years ago from Grants Pass, where he was manager of the United States National Bank. Two years ago he secured a

leave of absence to become district loan agent for the Smaller War Plants corporation with headquarters in Portland and recently was named secretary-manager of the Grants Pass Chamber of Commerce and planned to take the new post this month.

Cramer was secretary of the Oregon Bankers' Association nine years; worked previously for the Chase National Bank in New York, the United States National Bank in Portland and the First National Bank of Southern Oregon. He was president of the state secretaries section of the American Bankers Association in 1937.

Cramer represented Josephine County in the legislature in 1923, 1925 and 1927, and was

former president of the Grants Pass Chamber of Commerce. He is survived by his widow, two sons, a sister, Mrs. Jeanette Mason, of Tigard, Ore., and a brother, Arthur P. Cramer, San Francisco.

Funeral services will be held Wednesday in Corvallis.

Greek Election To Be Held Soon

Athens, April 10—(U.P.)—Admiral Petros Voulgaris, new premier of Greece, said today that his government will hold public elections at the earliest possible time.

He pledged the government to aid Greeks in economic reconstruction and the realization of Greek national rights. Earlier, the Athens radio said the new cabinet had been sworn in before Regent Archbishop Damaskinos last night.

STATUTE OF LIBERTY TO BLAZE ON VICTORY DAY

New York, April 10—(U.P.)—The torch on the Statue of Liberty will blaze with "electric fire" resembling actual flame when V-E day arrives. Westinghouse Electric and Manufacturing company said today.

"Dimmed during wartime lighting curfews and used merely as a warning marker for planes and ships, the torch flame which burns 300 feet above New York harbor will be relighted in a mighty blaze as a victory signal," the company said.

San Francisco, April 10—(U.P.)—A life free of Japanese brutality was a reality today for more than 800 American civilians who were held in Philippine internment camps for three years.

Their transport arrived here yesterday after a 7,000-mile voyage from Manila, which H. Ford Wilkins, former city editor of the Manila Bulletin, described as a "wrecked city."

Hundreds of relatives greeted the internees as they walked down the gangplank.

Deputy District Fire Marshall R. A. Warfield advised all parents whose children had such suits to "get rid of them immediately." He said the chaps were "highly inflammable, and regardless of what anyone can do, kids are going to get around a fire at one time or another."
