Planting of Trees Urged To Prevent Soil Erosion, Declares Garden Club.

Planned as a climax to annual garden week, to be held this year between April 15 and 22, the Medford Garden club is promoting the observance of Arbor day, April 22. Declaring that tree planting is needed now more than ever before, Mrs. W. C. Bookard, program chairman for the garden club, today issued a statement about the purposes of the special day.

Arbor day should mean more this year to every citizen in our country," Mrs. Bookard stated. "Other holidays repose upon the

past, while Arbor day proposes for the future.

"Tree planting is needed now more than ever before. The tremendous inroad on our forests due to war is bringing their replacements squarely before us. The percentage is something like 15 trees planted to every 150 destroyed.

Beautifying Step
"How will our future generations survive if we do nothing to protect them? To our liberty and freedom-loving ancestors we owe much; our pride should urge that our grandchildren may say the same of us.

"Every tree planted by a school child arouses his interest and is a step in the right direction; every tree planted by an individual or two is two steps up. We would not have a repetition of March 21 to 25, 1935, when thick dust clouds settled over our eastern Oregon and the middle west. Such a picture is possible for our beautiful Pacific coast.

"Pulpit and press, patriotic and civic groups should interest themselves to make a more beautiful as well as safe America.
