

## Stub Allison Ousted As California Grid Mentor

Berkeley, Cal., April 11—(U.P.) The University of California today began a nation-wide search for a new head football coach after putting a pink slip in Leonard B. (Stub) Allison's last paycheck.

Allison, connected with Golden Bear gridiron fortunes since 1931 and chief character builder since 1935, was notified yesterday that his present one-year contract would not be renewed when it expires next May 31. Graduate Manager Clinton W. Evans, who made the announcement, said Allison previously had declined an opportunity to resign.

The gruff "top sarge" hit his peak in 1937 when his powerful "thunder team," sparked by Sam Chapman, went through 11 games without a defeat and lost off Alabama in the Rose

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## HUNTERS SEARCH OREGON FORESTS FOR EXTRA MEAT

Portland, Ore., April 11—(U.P.)—Despite curtailment of gasoline, 51,000 big game hunters stalked through Oregon's forests during 1943 in search of ration points running wild.

The two-year-old estimate is the latest one available, but it is indicative of the ever-increasing return to nature. Some game animals are being killed off too rapidly; these must be replaced. Some are increasing too rapidly. In this case the hunting season must be lengthened so that the population may be cut until the land can support the game.

**Birds Plentiful**  
A census of Oregon's game population reveals a number of species rarely hunted but appearing in abundance. For instance, the following may be shot in the state within state game commission season: Ducks, geese, grouse (Sooty and Blue), Hungarian partridges, prairie chickens, quail, sage hens and Chinese pheasants.

Fish planting throughout the state has slackened off considerably. During 1942, only three species were planted. At the present time bass, catfish, crappie, perch, salmon, shad, striped bass, sturgeon, sun fish, and trout may be angled for during their respective seasons.

**Big Game Found**  
And not forgetting the deer and the antelope. The following species of big game are found in Oregon: Antelope, deer, white-tail, blacktail, mule, Roosevelt elk, Rocky Mountain elk, black bear, mountain sheep, fox, badger, beaver, marten, mink, fisher, otter, muskrat, raccoon, ringtail cat, skunk, weasel, lynx, bobcat, mountain lion, coyote and wolves.

War-time reports compiled by the Forest Service show that hunting has increased during war-time, but nimrods visit the forests for shorter periods, intent on securing a few extra ration points, not in enjoying the sport.

The four-round semi-windup will pit Ernie Piluso, crack Portland junior heavyweight, against Tony Ross, who showed a tendency to steer clear of the dirty stuff in his last match here.

## Ice Arena Will Close For Month

The Medford Ice Arena will close April 15 for a month or six weeks, according to John Hein, manager. Reason for the closing was given as regular spring work being done at the Medford Ice and Storage company plant, from which the arena gets its freezing power. New equipment is being installed at the storage plant as well as a check-up of other equipment which necessitates shutting down machinery operating the ice arena.

## Schmeling Said In Prison Camp

With U. S. Ninth Army, April 11—(U.P.)—Max Schmeling, former world heavyweight champion, was reported today to be imprisoned at a Wehrmacht deserters camp in Pappenburg near Bremen, where more than 100,000 former German soldiers have died of starvation and cruel treatment.

An informant said Schmeling was sent to the camp by Nazi party orders along with Illy Forst, former German movie star, and Adolf Hauser, former German middleweight boxing champion.
