

KLAMATH WOULD BE SITE FOR BIG U. S. CEMETERY

Klamath Falls, April 11—Location of a national cemetery in the vicinity of the new Klamath Falls cemetery west of town near Klamath river was suggested locally today as further information came from Washington on the proposed project.

The city council is having plans prepared showing available ground in the area in which the new cemetery park is being established.

To Cut Travel
An Associated Press story from Washington said that two cemeteries are recommended for Oregon by the quartermaster corps in an effort to minimize the distance traveled by families and friends of those eligible to burial in the federal plots.

Quoting from the story: The quartermaster corps recorded 2395 Spanish American war veterans in the state, 40,203 veterans of World War I and

14,673 registrants in World War II. Estimating that the bodies of 26,201 victims of World War II will be brought from their temporary resting places overseas, and that 20,960 grave sites will be needed for widows and wives of veterans, the QMC prepared for 75,000 grave sites.

Center Near Portland
The location of the larger cemetery (50,000) at Portland established the transportation maximum at 100 miles for the majority of the veteran population. "As the center of population of the state is located about 65 miles inland from the (Pacific) coast and about 30 miles south of Portland."

Says the report: "Portland, as the largest city in the state and therefore a natural point of interest, is an ideal location for a national cemetery, being situated in a country of great natural beauty. It is also the center of very large industries, such as lumber and wool. It is the most important railroad and highway junction in the state."

Klamath Falls was designated for the other cemetery because it is the largest city in southern Oregon and is a county seat.
