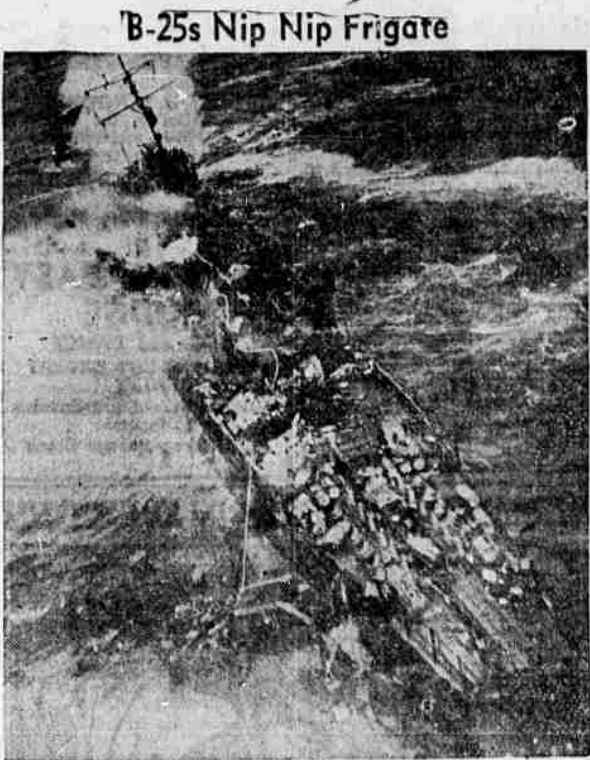

ANSWERING BRIEF IN MURDER CASE

An answering brief to the defense demurrer to the wording of the indictment brought against Fred A. Wolf, charged with second degree murder, was filed by the district attorney yesterday.

Wolf is charged with the murder of Percy H. James, during a sidewalk altercation at Gold Hill last February 4. The defense demurrer, filed by Attorney Don R. Newbury, contends the indictment should be more specific in designating the death weapon, instead of the phrase "sharp instrument." The state in its answer contends this is sufficient upon which to base the charge. Circuit Judge Herbert K. Hanna is expected to hear arguments on the demurrers early next week.

With this point settled, Wolf held in the county jail, will enter a plea and trial date will be set.

Workers In Rocket Plants To Observe Own Curfew Rules

Camden, Ark. (AP)—While the nation still talked about the recently-invoked midnight curfew on amusement places, construction workers at the big naval ordnance plant here began observing their own curfew rules.

The curfew for daytime workers living in hutsments on the plant grounds is 9 p. m., while Protection Specialists keep a continual 24-hour patrol throughout the area to keep down noises that might disturb day sleepers who work on the night shifts.

Camden city officials reported that when the curfew role went into effect, scores of professional gamblers, who had come into the city to prey on the workers, disappeared, while a large number of beer parlors and "honky-tonks" that had sprung up along the highways near the plant closed up because of lack of business.

Meanwhile, W. C. Page, personnel director at the plant, praised the construction workers, who he said "have made remarkable progress despite many handicaps and obstacles."
