

TABLE ROCK MAN'S BROTHER HONORED BY KING GEORGE

An article by Gault MacGowan, war correspondent at Gen. Bradley's headquarters in Germany, tells of the decoration by King George of Maj. Gen. Leven C. Allen, chief of staff of Gen. Bradley. Gen. Allen is the brother of A. C. Allen of the Table Rock district and the general has spent much time with his brother here.

The article states that Gen. Bradley now has under his com-

mand over one million men, the largest field command in United States history—the 9th army. The correspondent says: "I saw Gen. Bradley today with his chief of staff, Maj. Gen. Leven C. Allen, and both presented the appearance of an unruffled and happy pair. Bradley, his hands in his pockets, leaned against a wall as he discussed one phase of the current operations with Allen as though four armies presented no more problems than one. But earlier I had had a long conversation with both and I know that the fighting today is presenting more problems in applied mathematics and logistics than practically anything hitherto."

Two-Man Job

"It is Gen. Bradley who gives the troops their targets. It is his headquarters where strategy and tactics merge. This is a strategic and tactical job—the strategy coming from Gen. Eisenhower, with Bradley and Allen turning it into applied tactics."

"Admiring Gen. Allen's facility as chief of staff, Field Marshal Bernard Montgomery asked King George to make him a companion of the Order of the Bath, one of Britain's highest royal honors, in recognition of his work in co-ordination and planning in conjunction with Field Marshal Montgomery's February drive toward the Rhine. Now the scarlet ribbon of the order splashes added color on Gen. Allen's chest."

Work Together

"Gens. Bradley and Allen are like two fingers together, with Bradley the index, and Gen. Allen is his deputy when the commander goes forward, and is his adviser on personnel, logistics, enemy information, supply, planning and civil affairs when both are together. All incoming information from the four armies and all outgoing instructions from Gen. Bradley are channeled through Gen. Allen."

"Gen. Allen has been responsible, wholly or in part, for the indoctrination of 85 per cent of all American army officers. He succeeded Bradley as command-

ant of the Fort Benning, Ga., infantry school in February, 1942, when Bradley went to Tunisia. Gen. Allen turned out officers at the rate of 1,200 weekly. He has grown with the armies he helped to create, until now, as chief-of-staff of the greatest American field force in history—fortified by his experience in the war plans division of the general staff in Washington—he can feel confident with Gen. Bradley that this colossal operational command will work."

PLANE TO AGAIN SPRAY LOCAL PEAR ORCHARDS

PIECEMEAL PEACE MAY BE OUTCOME CHURCHILL HINTS

London, April 13—(UP)—Prime Minister Churchill hinted in Commons today that the Allies foresee a necessity of forcing isolated German army segments and areas into unconditional surrender over some period of time.

Churchill said in a brief answer to a question in Commons: "The policy of unconditional surrender does not exclude unconditional surrender piecemeal, and is not necessarily applied only to wholesale surrender."

Laborite Rhys Davies questioned Churchill regarding Gen. Dwight D. Eisenhower's letter to President Roosevelt saying there probably never would be a clean cut German military capitulation.

Asked whether he had read the statement, Churchill answered "Yes Sir." It was "No Sir" to a question whether he would make a statement on it.

HANNA SUSTAINS WOLF DEMURRER

Circuit Judge Herbert K. Hanna in a ruling yesterday sustained the defense demurrer to the second degree murder charge against Fred A. Wolf, 63, and directed the grand jury be reconvened for reconsideration of the case. District Attorney George W. Neilson said the grand jury would meet next Wednesday.

The demurrer, filed by Attorney Don R. Newbury, counsel for Wolf, contended the indictment should have specifically described the death weapon, instead of referring to it as a "sharp instrument," a technical point. The court ruled that to prevent the possibility of error a new indictment be drawn.

Wolf, held in the county jail, is charged with causing the death of Percy H. James, by inflicting a fatal wound as the climax of a sidewalk altercation at Gold Hill the night of last February 4.
