## DON'T WATCH YOUR DIET

It has been profitable as well as entertaining reading these past 15 years. I have learned a good deal from your articles, not just about health alone but many other things. Yet in spite of your lambent style I find many inconsistencies in your teachings and I wonder if you don't take a special delight in being perverse and unconventional upon as many questions as possible. For instance in one lesson you ridicule the idea of watching one's diet, and then in another lesson (the one about "Yankee Stomach") you saw it occurs whenever people are unwise about their eating and drinking and careless about their digestion. Well? (T. L. H.)

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You have me at a disadvantage, but not in a dilemma. Had you quoted enough from the article about "Yankee Stomach" you would have realized there is no inconsistency there, for as I went on to explain, people are careless about their digestion particularly that part of digestion that goes on (a) in the mouth during mastication and (b) in the stomach for half an hour or more after the food is swallowed if the food has been well chewed. Just between ourselves and not for publication I confess my dear colleague, that in running all over the place as I do, sometimes I meet what seems to be myself coming, and I have to duck down the nearest dark alley to avoid the clash.

And speaking of saving your teeth, may I ask rhetorically, of course, and with little expectation of getting an answer, just what, if anything, YOUR dentist has done about saving your teeth—aside from making such repairs as you reluctantly seek and grudgingly pay for when you can't limp along without them?

Dentists are absurdly squeamish about their legal right to use the title "Doctor" (which no one can dispute), but at the same time they seldom live up to the title, which means teacher, when young people with neglected teeth come under their care. Trouble with the dentists is they are too glib—and the shrewd business men who exploit them want to keep them so.

## QUESTIONS AND ANSWERS

What do you advise as treatment for piles in the early stage? (E. B.)

# ARMY OFFICERS IN WARD STORES ARE TARGET IN PLAINT

Chicago, April 13. — (U.P.) — Montgomery Ward and Co., officials today awaited a report from the army in reply to company charges that army officers controlling two of its seized properties were guilty of misconduct.  
Harold L. Pearson, vice president and treasurer of Wards, demanded yesterday that the army take immediate action to "protect" the Ward properties at San Rafael, Calif., and Jamaica, N. Y.

In a letter to Maj. Gen. Joseph W. Byron, army manager of the seized properties, Pearson said army operations at the two stores had impaired employee morale, interfered with service to customers and exposed the company to financial loss.  
Pearson said the company had affidavits to prove that some of the controlling army officers "forced attentions on female employees in a manner destructive to store morale." He accused several of the officers at San Rafael of drunkenness and of entertaining girls in the store.  
"Affidavits covering many other instances of reported misconduct could not be obtained because the witnesses have husbands or sons in the army and fear retaliation," Pearson added.
