

FSA BORROWERS ASKED TO MAKE REQUEST EARLY

Farm security borrowers or other farmers in Jackson county who will need new or supplemental FSA credit to carry out this year's farming operations are asked to contact the county supervisor's office as soon as possible to insure available loan funds, states Bruce E. Stewart, county FSA supervisor, 211 Fluhrer building.

All borrowers whose farm plans indicate additional credit will be needed before new loan funds become available late in July should complete application unless credit is available through other channels. Every effort will be made to hold sufficient funds to cover borrowers whose needs are made known during the next four to six weeks.

Other farmers unable to secure adequate credit for livestock, feed needs and other operating goods necessary for efficient use of their land resources are eligible for FSA loans and management assistance. Where necessary, part of the loan can be made for advance cash rent or limited repair for farm buildings. Loans are repayable over a five-year period on recoverable goods and bear 5 per cent interest on the unpaid balance.

Detailed information may be secured at the county office on Fridays or from county FSA farmer committees. They include Edward A. Chamberlain, Eagle Point; Earl Ulrich, Trull, and Edward P. Vilas, route 3, Medford.

Camp White Saves On Coal Bill by Salvaging Wood

Camp White—Salvaged wood for fuel has been used so successfully at this post that it has resulted in coal savings of over 65 per cent during the first 10 days of April, it was announced by the office of the post engineer.

During that time 191 tons of wood, equivalent to 111 tons of coal, were burned in barracks, offices, warehouses and mess halls, necessitating the use of only 57 tons of coal. All wood was salvaged from the reservation.

Equivalent savings have been made since January when Col. John R. Young, post commander, put into effect at this camp a conservation program to help overcome the 22,000,000-ton nationwide coal deficit.
