RUN-OFF WATERS IRRIGATE FIELDS

Run-off waters of the forks of Bear Creek were turned into the ditches of the Medford Irrigation district this week, Manager J. M. Spencer reports. The water is being used on pasture and alfalfa crops. The spring run-off is just getting started and all water will be used for irrigation.

Tests will be made the coming summer of a method for elimination of moss from irrigation ditches. Manager Spencer also reports. Moss is one of the leading ditch nuisances, clogging the water flow in the late summer. Some preliminary tests were made last year.

Bartlett and D'Anjou pears have started blooming, Assistant County Agent C. B. Cordy reports. Peach and apricot blossoming is over.

Planting of corn and shearing of sheep is expected to start before May 1, County Agent Robert G. Fowler states. He estimates that the corn acreage will be larger than last year and also predicts a good wool clip.
