

## SEARCH FOR WAR MOTHER WILL BE HELD IN OREGON

Salem, Ore., April 20 — (U.P.) — The "American War Mother" will be sought again this year—the woman who has the largest number of children in the armed services.

Gov. Earl Snell today announced the contest. The search for the "Oregon War Mother" will be conducted by Douglas Mullarky, private secretary to the governor. The winner will be placed in nomination in the national contest.

Nominations for the honor must be in Mullarky's hands by May 7, he said.

The winner last year was Mrs. Ella Garner, Oregon City, mother of eight service children. Mrs. Joe Thomas, La Grande, also had eight in service last year, but her nomination was received too late to be considered.

Mullarky said that enlistments during the year may reveal a mother in Oregon who has more than eight children in uniform.

## NEW INDICTMENT IN JAMES DEATH

The Jackson county grand jury yesterday returned a new indictment against James A. Wolf, charging him with the second degree murder of Percy H. James, in a sidewalk altercation at Gold Hill February 4 last. Wolf will enter a plea in circuit court and trial will be set for an early date, the district attorney said.

The new indictment was directed by Circuit Judge Herbert K. Hanna, after sustaining a demurrer of the defense setting forth the wording of the original true bill was not specific and definite in its description of the death weapon, as "a sharp instrument."

It now reads, on this technical point:

"James A. Wolf did kill one Percy H. James by stabbing one with a sharp pointed instrument, a more particular description to this grand jury being unknown."

## Halsey Favors Retaliation For Atrocities By Japanese

New York, April 20 — (U.P.) — Admiral William F. Halsey, Jr., commander of the Third U. S. Fleet, today charged the Japanese with vivisection, rape and cannibalism and demanded that after the war, one Japanese offender be put to death in retaliation for every one of "our men" murdered in the Pacific.

Halsey's plan was presented in a signed article in Collier's magazine. He urged that no peace treaty be entered with the Japanese and that a "prolonged armistice" be substituted. He said his staff joined him in "extremely violent hatred" of the Japanese.

"Most of the Japanese atrocity stories you hear about are not exaggerations," he said. "We have documented proof that some of our marines were vivisectioned, that some Nuns were subjected to 48 hours of continuous rape, and definite signs that the Japs practiced cannibalism on Guadalcanal and on Leyte."

Halsey demanded punishment in payment of "all Japs guilty of war crimes, without regard for rank or high position," and singled out Field Marshal Juchichi Terachi and General Tomoyuki Yamashita as deserving of special attention.

Outlining the military control which he maintained was necessary to handle the Japanese in the post-war period, Halsey said a United Nations Supreme Commander with a "free hand" should be placed in charge.

He said we "must make the Japanese race powerless, and then keep it powerless." With this in mind, he proposed three restrictions: That no Japanese ship should move without Allied approval, that all Japanese

should be stripped of all arms, of any kind, and that "most industrial material should be kept away from them without forcing them into starvation."
