Hospital Funds Needed

It is unfortunate that more people cannot visit the Shriners' hospital for crippled children at Portland. It would make the first local public appeal for contributions much easier.

A poor substitute for a first hand inspection of one of the fifteen great Shrine hospitals must be a brief statement of the crippled children program—truly one of America's greatest philanthropies.

THESE hospitals are crowded with pathetic little youngsters with warped bodies and twisted limbs. There was a time when children such as these would more likely receive derision than cures.

TODAY, things are different. The deformed child is now considered a responsibility of society if parents are financially unable to provide correct treatment.

IN this commendable work the Shriners have been pioneers—the first to establish a chain of orthopaedic hospitals with modern equipment, and to provide the leading surgeons in this field of medical science.

THE only trouble with the Shriners' hospital program—it cannot meet the need. Right here in Oregon's hospital at Portland, for example, the normal waiting list is 170—and that means 170 hopeful little children who NEED and should have the finest of treatment.

ONCE the need is understood, public generosity may be counted upon to meet this emergency. Many youngsters of this area have been treated at the Portland Shrine hospital; now the Jackson County Shrine club is asking Jackson County people to say "thank you", in a tangible way, with much needed contributions.

Probably few people have ever heard of this kindly man who founded this holiday and started the tree planting habit in America, but millions of trees stand today in tribute to a movement which is as practical as it is aesthetic.

THE conservation of trees is as important as planting, too. Wise and farsighted management of public and private forest lands is being extended, with selective cutting methods assuring sustained timber yields.

ARBOR Day will climax a garden-week observance—and that is so important, too, with foods so scarce. Victory gardens are as important this year as they were in more critical days of the war.
