NOW SEE HE RE, STUPID

"You are very unfair in your attitude toward graduate nurses. MUNICH BLASTED IN YANKEE RAID

London, April 21 — (U.P.) — More than 350 U. S. Eighth Air Force Flying Fortresses, escorted by 400 Mustangs, blasted rail facilities and airfields of three German cities today, in the sixth straight day of an air offensive to disrupt German transport.

Flying through what returning crewmen described as some of the worst weather they ever encountered, the planes attacked Munich, Ingolstadt and Landsberg. Six bombers were missing.

Today's raid made Munich one of the 10 most heavily bombed German cities. More than 10,500 tons of bombs have been dropped on the city, still a focal point for the remaining enemy railway system in southern Germany.

Jap Suicide Swords Badly Needed Now

Tokyo radio announced today that "under the able guidance of the Imperial Japanese army and navy," production of the traditional swords, which enemy officers flourish when leading suicide attacks, will be greatly increased.
