EAGLE PT. MAN GERMAN CAPTIVE FOR SHORT TIME

With the 99th Inf. Div. in Germany — Pvt. Wayne H. Jackson of Eagle Point, Oregon, is back on duty again laying wire for the 1st Bn., 394th Inf., after 12 days as a prisoner of war.

Jackson was laying wire near the Rhine river town of Honningen with two buddies when three Jerries popped out from behind some bushes. "We had our arms full of wire and the Krauts had three rifles sticking down our throats. They had the drop on us. We had to do what they said," remarked the Oregonian.

"Walking along a trail to ward the German lines, we were spotted by American troops," Jackson went on. "They opened up, and we all hit the ground. Two of the Germans were hit and both of my buddies were wounded. Then more Jerries came racing up and hustled us down the trail and out of sight of our troops."

Forced to Hike
The first two days Jackson trekked 30 miles to a PW cage on one Wehrmacht ration and a little water. Then when the First Army broke out of the Remagen bridgehead, the Germans started marching all their PW's eastward. To minimize greatly feared attacks by U. S. fighters and "Jabos" (fighter-bombers) the Heines marched their prisoners under cover of darkness.

Two days before Jackson was liberated, spearheading U. S. Tanks lacked only four miles of catching up with the PW column. But the prisoners were forced to the rear again.

"Our hopes of being freed had been built up so long that when the tanks of the 7th Armored Division, working with the 99th Div., did roll in, we couldn't believe it," said Jackson. "We just stood there and stared with unbelieving eyes at the tanks as they coughed and sputtered down the road. Maybe some of us smiled a little. We were too weak to cheer."

Pvt. Paul Creech
Pvt. Paul Creech, cook, whose wife, Helen, lives at 314 Laurel street, is a member of the 403rd Anti-aircraft Artillery Gun Battalion, whose 90-millimeter weapons, firing with precision at a range of 10 miles, have been knocking out German targets in Italy's Po valley.

Credited with more than 550 days in combat, the battalion has fired 115,000 rounds in the Italian campaign alone.

The 403rd was put ashore at Oran, Northern Algeria, May 11, 1943, protected installations in North Africa and later participated in defense of Palermo, Sicily.

Cecil Van Horn
Amarillo Army Air Field, Amarillo, Texas — Pvt. Cecil H. Van Horn, son of Mr. and Mrs. L. H. Van Horn of Gold Hill, Oregon, has completed his course of studies as an Electrical Mechanic in this Army Air Forces Technical Training School and is rated an Electrical Specialist on a B-29 Super Fortress.

Sgt. Marc Jarmin
With the Fifth Army, Italy — S/Sgt. Marc B. Jarmin, Jr., son of Mrs. Hazel Jarmin, 23 Corning Ct., Medford, Oregon, has been cited by the 86th Mountain Regiment of the 10th "Mountaineer"

Division and awarded the Combat Infantryman Badge for actual participation in combat against the enemy on the Fifth Army front in Italy.

Pfc. Charles Leaming
With the 83rd Infantry Division in Germany — Pfc. Charles L. Leaming of General Delivery, Talent, Ore., has been awarded the Combat Infantryman Badge for displaying exemplary conduct in action against the enemy. He is the son of Elizabeth M. Leaming, General Delivery, Talent, Ore.

Lt. John Saulsberry
An Eighth Air Force Bomber Base, England — First Lieutenant John M. Saulsberry, 23, of Jacksonville, navigator on an Eighth Air Force B-17 Flying Fortress, has been awarded the Air Medal.

The award was for "meritorious achievement" during bombing attacks by the 38th Bomb. Group against Nazi war industries and military targets in cooperation with Allied ground forces.

He is the son of Mr. and Mrs. W. F. Saulsberry of Jacksonville. He had been attending Oregon State College before entering the AAF in August, 1943.

Cpl. Warren Holbrook
An Eighth Air Force Bomber Station, England — Corporal Warren L. Holbrook, 21-year-old son of Mr. and Mrs. Leland J. Holbrook, 119 Crater Lake avenue, Medford, Oregon, has been decorated with the Air Medal. It was announced recently by the commanding general, Eighth Air Force.

Corporal Holbrook is a graduate of the Senior High School, Medford, Oregon, where he took an active part in the sports program as a member of the track, football and basketball teams.

Prior to his entry into the Army Air Forces on November 20, 1941, he attended the University of Oregon, Eugene, Oregon.

He is a member of the 384th

Bomb Group, a veteran unit with more than 290 missions to its credit.

A graduate of Grants Pass high school, the 25 year old Medford airman was employed by the Lockheed Aircraft Corp. at Burbank, Calif., prior to entering the service in February, 1943. He is married, Mrs. Espey living at the Riverside Street address. His parents live at Salem.

PIRATE PICTURE RING UNCOVERED

Hollywood, April 26 — (U.P.)—An alleged motion picture piracy ring, which marketed stolen films throughout the world, especially in South America, is being investigated by federal and state officials, it was revealed today. U. S. Attorney Charles H. Carr

said information gathered by the Federal Bureau of Investigation will be placed before the Federal Grand Jury, and secret indictments may be returned.

In some cases, it was said, a Hollywood film would be rushed away after a preview, filmed on a master negative, and 16 millimeter prints were distributed for home consumption in this country before the rightful distributors could market their product. The commercial reels would be returned to the theater within a few hours.

Some of the pirated films, Carr said, found their way into U. S. army posts in this country.
