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WHAT'S NO BEER?

A distinguished physician who is a recognized authority on alcoholism complains to this effect:

We are vastly interested in the problems of alcoholism... have a painfully large amount of mail from people who want information on the subject. Your column is of course widely and faithfully read. In fact, I am one of your most earnest followers and I think you are doing a grand job.

But I do get a little sour when I have 50 or 60 letters from your "faithful" saying in effect "Dr. Brady writes that a quart of beer a day is heavy drinking. Is this true? My husband—I—my brother, etc."

I have to sit down and write 50 or 60 or more letters and say in effect: "While I am myself a great admirer of Dr. Brady's column, this is one time that I cannot agree with him." Then I have to go on for a page or more to explain why I do not agree. Usually the letters that I write bring replies, and these replies need replies, etc., etc.

Now, as a matter of fact the particular husband that you wrote about gave an absurd alibi for his drinking: that being saturated with alcohol keeps colds and other germs away. Why not attack that phase of the problem. In the first place a quart of beer a day would not keep anyone "saturated with alcohol"...

From long experience with husbands such as your reader described I should say his "quart of beer a day" is an alibi. If he is getting ill effects from alcohol he is drinking something harder than beer. A good many alcoholics put away a half pint or more of whisky on the side, and drink their beer in public. Beer gets the blame.

I should have in my file the printed copy of the item to which my distinguished colleague refers, but I can't find it. As I recollect it, the wife was worried because her husband ate no breakfast but drank a large amount of beer instead, and went off to his day's work on that sustenance alone. I believe any one who regularly uses

beer, ale, wine, whisky or any other alcoholic beverage or liquor as a substitute for food must inevitably develop nutritional deficiency disease, such as beri beri, whether the manifestations of the disease are correctly diagnosed or not, and I contend that any one with such nutritional deficiency disease suffers from "degeneration."

QUESTIONS & ANSWERS
Never Tolerate a Mole
An MD told me never to have a mole removed, as nature is throwing off something and if the mole is removed it might come out inside. I have a mole on the hairline and it worries me.

Answer—If you quote the MD correctly which I doubt he must be a quaint character. Some moles are harmless and, if they do not embarrass you it is all right to tolerate them. But as a rule, I believe, it is better to have moles removed—of course by a qualified plastic surgeon. Especially if the mole becomes irritated or in any way troublesome. That notion of "nature throwing off something" is too absurd to mention.

I can't see to convince my family that sugar does not dissolve in iced tea. Please help me prove it to them.

Answer—Sugar dissolves in iced tea, although more slowly than in hot tea. You said there is never empty space in the stomach. Then how do you explain the uncomfortable feeling called hunger?

Answer—Contractions of stomach probably account for the uncomfortable "pangs" of hunger.
Sneezes or Cough Not Necessary
I am convinced from my own experience that your teachings are right. I believe neither cold, wet nor exposure gives one any illness, but some sneezing or coughing his germs at you can lay you low, whether you are warm or cold.

Answer—He can do it by just sneezing politely with you. If you are within three or four feet range. (Copyright, 1945, by John F. Dille Co.)

COMPANY FORMED TO DRILL FOR OIL

J. H. Officers of the company are J. H. Dawson, president, W. J. Crank, vice president, and Lew G. Gilman, secretary-treasurer. J. E. Zuber is general manager, and Glenn Bown is assistant general manager.

The company, Dawson said, owns a large No. 5 rotary drilling outfit which is being moved to location about twenty-three miles south of Burns.

German Horrors Worse Than Told Says Clare Luce

Washington, May 3.—(U.P.)—Blond Congresswoman Clare Boothe Luce, R., Conn., returned to the capital today prepared to tell her colleagues all she has seen during a two month tour of Germany and Italy and to advocate a "hard, hard peace" for the Germans.

atrocities camps were all and more than she had heard. "I wanted to believe in a good German people, really, but those who have seen those camps haven't the words to describe them," she said.
