## News From Jackson County for Men in the Armed Services

With the end of the war in Europe expected momentarily, churches and business men have completed plans for VE Day and await the final word. Churches will hold a union service of praise and thanksgiving.

Summer weather came to the valley this week, with highs of 91 recorded both Tuesday and Wednesday. An electrical storm occurred Wednesday evening, but so far as is known, set no fires. The warm weather has started the spring run-off from the hills and irrigators are making use of the water. Last snow survey made in Crater Lake park showed eight inches more water in the snow than for the same survey last year.

At a recent meeting of the Medford Izaak Walton league here the group released a formal resolution pledging support to State Game commission in its efforts to prevent the building of any high dams in the Rogue River.

Medford Council of Church Women held the annual May Fellowship Day program today and the Elks club held the annual crab feed and May party Tuesday night.

The good news of released prisoners continue to come in. Sgt. Lloyd Albem, who has been a prisoner-of-war of the Germans since last September, has been released and is expected home and Pfc. Truman J. Crawford was announced as released from a prisoner-of-war camp in the Philippine Islands. Also released from a German camp was Pfc. Clarence Nelson. His brothers are both in service, Capt. Ibsen Nelson being in the South Pacific and Cpl. Kermit Nelson being in Europe with the 3rd army.

Many wounded men were on this week's casualty list. Pfc. John P. Moffat and Lt. William D. Janes were both wounded while serving in Germany about the middle of April and Cpl. Charles F. Rice and Ray H. Mann have been wounded during action in the Pacific region. Staff Sgt. Jack H. Sparlin is also listed as having been wounded in European action and Pfc. Harold L. Barr, Prospect, and Sgt. Richard K. DeMers, Ashland, are listed as missing in action. Don D. Sellers of Trail was wounded while serving with the 41st division on Min-

danao. He has been overseas for more than three years.

Charles R. Burdett, chief commissary steward with the navy, was killed in action recently while on Pacific duty with the navy and Audrey Price Miles has been informed of the death of her husband, Sgt. Miles, who was with the 96th division in Okinawa.

M. Sgt. Clare L. Conaway has been awarded a bronze star for service in connection with aircraft raids on the Japanese mainland from the Mariana Islands. Sgt. Richard Foster, serving in the Southwest Pacific, has been decorated with an air medal. A letter from Lt. Bob Cuffel recently told of conditions on Saipan, where he is stationed with the 20th air force, and on Iwo Jima, where his ship landed for repairs on a return flight.

Capt. Dwight H. Findley is now chief of general surgery for the 26th general hospital at Bari, Italy, and Sgt. Robert Meals has just arrived overseas for duty as armorer gunner on a B-17. Cpl. Orval Thomas is serving with the 9th AAF in Germany as a radio repairman.

M. Sgt. Frank White and S. Sgt. Wayne White were recently home together for the first time in many months. The former is stationed at Los Angeles and the latter has returned to Camp Carson for hospitalization. He holds the silver star, bronze star, presidential citation, oak leaf cluster and combat infantryman's badge.

Sgt. Lynn DeMille is at Ft. George Wright hospital in Spokane after serving 27 months in the CBI theater and Capt. Fielding Weatherford is now attending the fighter transitional school at Greenwood, Miss., after having recently returned from the European theater of operations. Home from overseas are Sgt. Jesse Barcock, after 31 months in Italy and other theaters, and Marlon Hardy, SM3c, who served 14 months in the Pacific.

There has been considerable "Cupid's news" in recent days. Announced Sunday were the weddings of Dr. Luke Vorheis to Carol Crono of Eugene; Colleen Imhausen to Melvin Miller of Shady Cove; Delma Carter, Prospect, to Cpl. Delbert Parscel, marine; Elizabeth Evanson to William Carl Felleson of Orland, Calif., where the couple is residing, and Dortha Olsen to Capt. Raymond Ross. The captain, publicized by the American Division as its most famous patrol leader and organizer of the Dime a Dozen club, with the captain paying his scouts a dime for each 12 Japs they killed, is returning to the Philippine Islands the first of June.

The engagement of Huldah Rose to S. Sgt. J. L. Fisher of Springfield has been announced and Lee Spencer Bullis and his bride, the former Elizabeth Lawrence of Mansfield, Ga., have arrived in Medford to reside. The groom has been at Tulane university since his discharge from the navy.

The Junior Prom was held last week, and Nancy Swem was crowned queen. Her princesses were Evelyn Van Hise, Margo Gammill, Gloria Preston, Betty Lou Baker, Beverly Conser, June Bosworth and Joan Hoppe.

## MERCHANTS TELL PLANS TO CLOSE ON VICTORY DAY

Plans for observance of VE Day by Medford business firms were announced today by the Medford Merchants association. Closing time for stores when the announcement of Germany's collapse comes has been announced as follows:

If announcement is received after 12:00 noon, stores will be closed immediately and will remain closed the following day. If announcement is received before 12:00 noon, when the stores are open, the stores shall be closed immediately for the day only, and will be open the next business day.

If announcement is received at night, the stores will remain closed the next business day.

If announcement is received on Sunday, the stores will remain closed the next business day.

The announcement includes all beverage and soft-drink establishments.

For restaurants: if announcement is made before noon, they will remain open through the lunch hour till 2:00, then close for the balance of the day. If the announcement comes in the afternoon, they will close immediately and remain closed the following day.

Groceries and meat markets: if announcement is made during the day, they will close immediately for the day and open the following day. If announcement is made during the night, they will open the following day as usual. If the announcement comes on Saturday, they will remain open on Saturday and close on Sunday.
