

NAVY PERSONNEL RECLAIMS TIRES ON LARGE SCALE

New Orleans, (U.P.) — Rubber conservation that means more tires for civilians is being carried on by the Navy at the Navy Supply Depot in New Orleans.

Since the program was set up six months ago, thousands of tires—from motorcycle size on up to others weighing two-thirds of a ton—have passed through the capable hands of Navy and civilian personnel at the Navy Supply Depot.

Tires from all Navy vehicles in the Eighth Naval District, which includes Louisiana, Alabama, Mississippi, Arkansas, Oklahoma, Texas, Tennessee and Pensacola, Fla., are sent to district headquarters in New Orleans to be inspected, graded and prescribed for. Not a single tire is ever thrown away. Those found unsuitable for the Navy are sold to rubber companies, which are able to dispose of them in some useful way. The

cases graded as redeemable are patched or retreaded, and used, re-used, and then re-used again.

Send In Old Tires

So there won't be any slip-ups or waste, any Navy installation needing tires must send the same number of old ones to the Naval Supply Depot. In other words, if the huge new ammunition plant at Camden, Ark. — which uses as many tires as the rest of the Eighth Naval District combined — needs 50 tires, the order must be accompanied by 50 damaged ones. In this way, the process moves at high speed, and there are no casings lying around idle. By doing this, the Navy has reduced its demand for tires, which in turn makes more available for civilian use.

All tires come under the expert eyes of the "tire doctors." At a glance, these "doctors" can tell exactly what happened to each tire to put it out of use. If a tire was run on after it was flat, they can tell—and do something about it. A report is sent to the commanding officer of the Navy installation that used the damaged tire. He in turn takes disciplinary measures with the man who failed to change the flat tire at once.
