Ashland Council Favors Route 99 As Main Highway

Ashland.—The Ashland city council, in a resolution, recently petitioned the Oregon State Highway commission to designate Highway 99 through Ashland as the main inter-regional highway.

The council listed three reasons to substantiate their resolution. They were (1) U. S. Highway 99 is an all-year route, generally free from snow and capable of being used without hazard any season of the year. (2) U. S. Highway 99 serves many populated areas along its route through Rogue river, Umpqua and Willamette valleys. (3) U. S. Highway 99 is well provided with facilities for service of motor vehicles and accommodations for the public.

FIRST FOREST FIRE OF YEAR NEAR ELK CREEK

First forest fire of the 1945 season for the Rogue River National Forest service occurred Thursday afternoon, it was reported today. The blaze was confined to a single pine snag in the Elk Creek district near the deer lick, Wake Up Cal, and resulted from Wednesday night's electrical storm, forest employees said.

R. H. Bosworth, rancher, reported the fire to forest officials and Lowell Ash, fire guard from Union Creek, extinguished the blaze. A fire guard is patrolling the Butte Falls district today in an effort to discover if any fires were set there.

INDIA CONTRIBUTES
