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ENLISTMENTS ARE SOUGHT BY LOCAL STATE GUARD UNIT

Acting in connection with a state-wide drive to fill the ranks of the Oregon State Guard, Lieut. O. E. Sabin, commanding Company A, local infantry rifle unit, has announced a schedule of activities tended to attract enlistments.

"Veterans of both World Wars will be of great assistance to us," stated Lieut. Sabin, "and all

civilians enlisting will profit by the training course offered by the Guard. Young men of sixteen can also be enlisted upon showing written permission from parents or guardians."

The government provides regular army equipment for guard units. Each man receives a woolen and a sun-tan uniform outfit, full field equipment, and is armed with either a 30 caliber regulation rifle, or a 45 caliber sub-machine gun. The training course includes basic training, target practice, scouting and patrol instruction, first aid and chemical warfare instruction.

Sabin pointed out that State Guard duty did not interfere with any guardman's daily vocation, drills being held on Tuesday evenings, in the local armory. He also calls attention to a

new recreational program being arranged to fill in evenings when guardsmen seek recreation, and to the showing of U. S. army training films now available for State Guard use.

Enlistment applications are received in the "orderly room" at the local armory each Tuesday from 8 p. m. until 10 p. m.
