First Tornado Victory at Grants Pass in 5 Years as Fawcett Gives Up 9 Hits.

For the first time in five years, Medford high school's baseball team defeated Grants Pass on their own diamond 6 to 3 Friday afternoon. Dick Fawcett, on the mound for the Tornado, gave up nine hits to the Cavemen while his teammates were collecting seven but two Grants Pass errors in the sixth inning gave Medford two runs. Two other Tornado runners crossed the plate for the game's biggest inning.

Catcher Bob Watson was Medford's big stick, collecting a double and single out of five trips to the plate and batting in three runs besides scoring once. Jack Lutz, who beat Medford 5 to 3 here three weeks ago, struck out 15 Tornado batters while Fawcett sat down nine. Lutz, showing good control, issued but one free pass. Fawcett walked two. Grants Pass, got the longest hit of the day, a triple.

GIANTS, DODGERS, CUBS WIN; YANKS, CHISOX KNOTTED

New York, May 5—(U.P.)—Paul Derringer, who is making his 15 years of big League pitching experience pay off in important victories, beat the World Champion St. Louis Cardinals today, 5 to 1.

It was big Paul's fourth victory without defeat, and each has come over the teams regarded as the ones the Cubs must beat to win the National League pennant—St. Louis and Pittsburgh. Each has fallen before Derringer twice.

The New York Giants took an even firmer grip on first place in the National League by thumping the Boston Braves twice—15 to 5 and 6 to 4. Boston outbit the leaders in the first game, 13 to 11, but Boston pitchers gave nine walks and the Giants hitting was timely.

Brooklyn's Dodgers sent their batting averages up by slamming Philadelphia Phillies' pitchers for 27 hits in 10 to 1 and 12 to 8 victories. Curt Davis won his third game against one loss in the second game.

Cincinnati and Pittsburgh were rained out.

In the American League, the improving St. Louis Browns evened matters with Dizzy Trout and the Detroit Tigers with a 5 to 0 win. Trout had shut out the Browns in the second game of the season.

Old Tony Cuccinello kept the Chicago White Sox in a first-place tie with the New York Yankees by singling home Dick-shot in the last of the ninth for a 3-2 win over the Cleveland Indians. The Yanks slugged Rex Cecil of the Boston Red Sox for five runs after two were out in the first inning and went on to a 7 to 3 win.

George Case led Washington to a 7 to 3 victory over Philadelphia. He hit safely five times, drove home three runs and stole one base in handling Connie Mack's team its fifth loss in a row.
