Horror Camps To Be Reported On By Congressmen

Washington, May 10—(U.P.)—Twelve congressmen who inspected Nazi concentration camps at the request of Gen. Dwight D. Eisenhower prepared today to give a detailed report to congress on the "pattern of death" they found.

The delegation, arriving here by plane from Europe last night, said in a joint statement they had found conditions in the camps they visited "almost beyond power of words to describe."

Senators making the trip included Albert Thomas, D., Utah, and Representatives Ed W. Isaac, D., Calif., James W. Mott, R., Ore., and Dewey Short, R., Mo.

LAWRENCE J. KAISER KILLED IN GERMANY
First Lieutenant Lawrence J. Kaiser, a teacher at Lincoln school here before he entered the army, was killed in action in Germany April 15, according to word received today.

Torture By Japs To Learn Secrets Told By Soldier

Washington, May 10—(U.P.)—The army medical center disclosed today that the Japanese three times tortured a U. S. soldier, now in Walter Reed hospital, with heated rods in a futile effort to extort information. The victim was Cpl. Arthur A. Chenoweth of Jennings, Kan., who indicated other U. S. soldiers received similar treatment.

"They never got anything out of us," he said, "even with their hot rods."

On June 15, 1943, Chenoweth was burned on the back and shoulders, on November 20, the hot rods were applied to his forearms, and on December 2 he was

burned on both thighs. The Japanese, Chenoweth said, wanted information about the activities of certain other prisoners in the camp.
