

JVILLE GRANGE ACTS IN FAVOR OF HIGHWAY 99

The Jacksonville Grange Tuesday unanimously passed a resolution favoring choice of highway 99 as the inter-regional route from Canada to Mexico.

WHEREAS the Oregon area served by Highway 99 is a more diversified and extensive agricultural section than are the areas served by either Highway 97 or Highway 58,

AND WHEREAS the first mentioned area requires the trucking of vast amounts of farm produce to markets and equipment and supplies from the cities to the farms,

AND WHEREAS this area serves more than double the population than exists in either of the two other areas,

BE IT THEREFORE RESOLVED: that Jacksonville Grange go on record as endorsing the selection, by the State Highway Commission of Highway 99, as the Inter-regional Highway.

Passed by the Jacksonville Grange, this 8th day of May, 1945.
