

Helser Finds Range To Thump San Diego 8 To 0

Screwy southpaws have been the butt of many a baseball joke but the San Diego Padres found nothing to laugh about last night when they met Mr. Roy Helser of the Portland Beavers.

Cocky after two straight wins over the Pacific Coast league leaders, the Padres could touch Helser's lefthanded slants for only four hits as he pitched

Portland to an 8-0 triumph. He racked up eight strikeouts and had strong batting support from his teammates, including a homer by Frank Shone. The victory enabled the Beavers to stretch their first-place margin to four games.

The Seattle Rainiers slipped into second ahead of San Diego by downing the Sacramento Senators for the third time, 6-1. The Oakland Acorns dropped to fourth place by losing to Los Angeles, 5-1. It also marked the first loss for Len Gilmore, ace Acorn pitcher, after three straight wins.

San Francisco made it three straight over Hollywood with a 10-3 decision at Seals stadium.

Fish Lake looms as the best fishing spot for the week-end, according to Al Piche, who each week amasses information on various streams of southern Oregon. Catches are easily made with flashers in brass finish, Piche reported. Bait fishing is said to be fair. Many anglers reported limit catches all week and fishing is expected to be good for several weeks because of the low water, which is seven feet below normal.

Catfishing at Squaw Lake is very good now with trout fishing fair to poor because of high water. The lake is expected to be better three weeks from now.

Salmon fishing is still only fair in most of Rogue river. From the mouth at Gold Beach to Canfield Riffle is poor due to snow water, according to Frank D. Colvin, Gold Beach sportsman. A few fish are taken each day but no trout or steelhead. Best fishing in the section the past week has been with eggs at Hardy Riffle.

Vesta Barnard, Prospect, reported earlier in the week that she caught a 3½ pound rainbow, measuring 20 inches, at the covered bridge near Prospect. She

said there was good fishing there at the time. Good fishing with eggs is reported from the shore at Prospect dam.

Little Butte is improving with best fishing up-stream. Water is now the right color for eggs or splinters.

Big Butte creek is "on and off" with water reported in fine color for flies. Spinners are getting fast sport and eggs will catch fish in deep holes.

Little Applegate river is said to be good past Bunkum while the Big Applegate is good up or down stream from Ruch.

The season at Diamond Lake opens May 30 but a report says the road from the Medford side probably will not be opened before June 15 due to deep snow. It may be forthcoming before opening date.

Hyatt Lake is still snow-bound and fishing at Emigrant Lake is good from boat or shore.
