

PARADE, PROGRAM SCHEDULED HERE ON MEMORIAL DAY

First plans for Medford's celebration of Memorial Day, Wednesday, May 30, were made at a meeting of representatives of veteran and patriotic societies held recently at the Hotel Medford. Mrs. Fred Lawrence, president of the local Women's Relief corps, presided at the meeting.

It was decided to have a program similar to those of recent years. A patriotic street parade will be formed at the city park at 10 a. m. and will move on Main street to Bear Creek bridge where there will be a brief ceremony. The parade will then return to the city park for an appropriate service.

All fraternal, social and civic betterment organizations of Medford and neighboring communities are invited to take part in the parade and they, with the general public, are invited and urged to attend the ceremony in the city park, committee heads state.

Graves of veterans in cemeteries of this vicinity will be decorated.

The annual Memorial Sunday service will be at St. Mark's Episcopal church, North Oakdale and Fifth streets, at 11 a. m. May 27, it is stated. The public is invited to attend this service, of an impressive nature. All veterans of all wars, with their families, and all members of patriotic societies are especially urged to be present, it is stated. The Rev. George R. Turney, rector of the church, will conduct the service.

Three local youths were enlisted in the navy in Portland May 8, the Medford navy recruiting office has been informed. They are John L. Holmes, son of Mr. and Mrs. Claude C. The young men are now at their homes awaiting orders to report in San Diego for "boot" training.

He is now in San Diego for indoctrination training after which he will be sent to the radar school in Chicago for 11 months of additional training in radio, television and radar.

RAYMOND CROSBY LONG A PRISONER, REPORTED FREED

Cpl. Raymond B. Crosby, who has been a prisoner of Germany since Feb. 14, 1942, when he was captured in Tunisia, has been released, according to a message received by his parents, Mr. and Mrs. David B. Crosby, 945 Murray avenue. Crosby said his son had been interned at Stalag 3B until September of 1944 when he was transferred to Luft 3, later being moved to Stalag 17C at Krems, Austria, from where he was liberated, apparently by the Russian army.

Cpl. Crosby was awarded the silver star for gallantry in action, the presentation being made to his parents during the time he was a prisoner of war. In January 1944 the parents received two telegrams from the War Department saying mention of their son had been heard in enemy broadcasts. Prior to the message received yesterday, the Crosbys had not received word of their son for five months, according to the father.

A graduate of Medford high school with the class of 1940, Cpl. Crosby was a basketball and track star and won honorable mention on the all-district basketball teams of 1938 and 1940.

MEMBER OF 91ST DIES DURING DUTY IN ITALY

Mrs. Amy Putnam of Central Point has received word of the death of her nephew, Cpl. Elmer Bunyard, in Italy. The corporal was with the 91st Infantry division and was stationed at Camp White for a time with the division.

Cpl. Bunyard had been in Italy 14 months. His mother, reported to be seriously ill, resides in Colfax, Ia.

Farm Machinery Production Will Set New Record

Washington, May 16.—(U.P.)—Farm machinery manufacturers are getting ready for the biggest production year in history as the result of a post-V-E Day relaxation on materials, it was learned today.

War food administration officials expressed hope that farm machinery output during the 12 months beginning July 1 will rise 25 or 30 per cent above this year. This would top the record production of 1941.

The bright outlook is in direct contrast to the situation manufacturers faced a little more than a month ago.

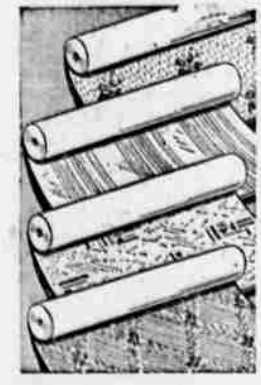
