

## MORE ROOSEVELT SELECTIONS DUE TO LEAVE POSTS

Washington, May 24.—(U.P.)—President Truman has released four of the 10 cabinet members he inherited from Franklin D. Roosevelt, and insiders said today that several more were slated to go.

The net effect appears to be a potentially more conservative administration.

In announcing the cabinet changes at his news conference yesterday Mr. Truman said he had resignations on file from every official who can resign. He remarked that he could accept them at will.

With the cabinet shake-up came announcement that Harry L. Hopkins had been sent to Moscow on a "special diplomatic mission." The language of the announcement permitted the assumption that Hopkins might not return to his job as "special assistant to the president."

The White House shakeup has just begun. Most of the Roosevelt intimates will go it is understood here. Judge Samuel I. Rosenman of New York, special counsel to the late President Roosevelt, will abandon his White House desk by June 15. He plans to open law offices in New York.

David K. Niles of Massachusetts, one of the political manipulators among Mr. Roosevelt's White House associates, also is understood to be on the way out.

Hopkins probably will begin to fade from the political scene when his diplomatic duties are discharged. His mission to Moscow appears to be to seek some mutual agreement with Marshal Josef V. Stalin on some of the points covered by the last big three conference at Yalta. Hopkins accompanied Mr. Roosevelt on all such expeditions.

## WALLACE FAVORS LOWERING TARIFF

New York, May 24.—(U.P.)—Secretary of Commerce Henry A. Wallace today urged that the nation prepare to lower its tariff and encourage world trade on a "live and let live" basis. He told the New York Foreign Trade Week committee that the "great mistake" of the 1920's was "that we gave foreign nations reason to believe that we never would allow them to send enough goods into the United States to balance our exports, States to balance our exports, with no margin to pay even the interest on the money which we have loaned abroad."

"This time I trust we shall choose the path which leads to a large volume of exports which can eventually be established on a sound sustained basis."

## CHICAGO DRIVERS CALL OFF STRIKE

Chicago, May 24.—(U.P.)—Raise seeking Chicago truck drivers were returning to their war-vital jobs today to end a paralyzing week-long strike called off less than six hours before the government was to have seized trucking lines involved.

Officials of the independent Chicago truck drivers union ordered the 6,500 strikers back to work shortly after President Truman authorized the office of defense transportation to take over as of 12:01 today.

The president's order came

while an estimated 1,500 specially-detailed troops camped on the shores of Lake Michigan ready to seize and operate the 10,000 trucks idled by the walk-out which halted deliveries of food, drugs and war material in the Chicago area.

## OWNERS PET DOGS HELD FOR DEATH

Miami, Fla., May 24.—(U.P.)—Joseph Munn, 43, will be tried by the criminal court of record at its next session on charges of manslaughter in connection with the death of Mrs. Doretta M. Zinke, at the teeth of a pack of his pit terriers.

At the conclusion of a five hour hearing at which Oppenborn acted as coroner the justice of the peace ruled against Munn on all counts. He found that Munn knew the "propensity of viciousness" of the dogs knew that they were running at large, and "did not take proper precautions to have said dogs properly enclosed."

**How to Can Fresh Pineapple**  
Prepare by peeling, "eying" and coring. Pack into clean jars, cover with hot syrup, using a thin or medium or heavy syrup (thin syrup, 1 cup sugar to 2 cups water; medium, 1 1/2 cups sugar to 2 cups water; heavy, 2 cups sugar to 2 cups water) to within 1 inch of top of jar. Adjust lids to jars according to type used, seal self-sealing lids. Process in hot water bath for 20 minutes for quarts, counting time after the water to the top of the jars starts to boil. Or, process in a pressure cooker for 10 minutes at 5 pounds pressure. Tighten lids of all but self-sealing jars after processing is finished. Do not invert jars to cool.
