

## NEW REGULATIONS ON SERVICEMEN'S MAIL ANNOUNCED

New postal regulations of interest to relatives of servicemen have been received by the Medford post office. Postmaster Frank DeSouza announces. The new instructions apply to mail for prisoners-of-war, and to the mailing of Christmas and other packages.

Regarding prisoner-of-war mail, it is stated that no mail of any kind addressed to American or other Allied prisoners of war in Europe shall be accepted for mailing. This does not apply to mail for prisoners of war in the Far East, which may be accepted as previously instructed. The notice states that due to liberation of the prisoners and conditions in Europe at this time, mail cannot be delivered and any on hand now will be returned to the sender.

Dates have been set for the mailing of Christmas packages, the bulletin states and will be Sept. 15 to Oct. 15, as was the case last year. Complete instructions will be published nearer the mailing time.

A bulletin from the navy department states that parcels presented for mailing cannot be accepted unless addressed to some specific individual. In the past certain organizations have made up packages which were to be delivered to some member of the navy, coast guard or marine corps who otherwise would not receive packages but it is now stated that these will no longer be accepted.

## Coos Judge To Hear Two Jackson Cases

The Taylor suit is for money for the alleged failure of the dredging company to restore dredged land, per contract. The Welch action is for money.

## Sunshine Needed For Strawberries

Some local strawberries have been coming to market for the past 10 days but it will require a period of sunshine to increase the yield. Those already received are principally from the Oak Grove district. Assistant County Agent C. B. Cordy reports there will be fewer berries than last year due to a curtailed acreage.

Cherries have started to set and there will be a fair crop. None will be ready for market for two or three weeks and like all other crops need warm weather and sunshine.

## FIRE FIGHTING PLANE WILL BE BASED HERE

H. C. Obye, supervisor of Siskiyou National forest, announced today that an airplane, with enough room for the pilot and seven men, will be based at Medford airport during the summer months. The plane will be used to carry fire fighters to blazes throughout the Siskiyou forest area. Larry Soler has been secured as pilot.

Another plane will be based near the Redwood ranger station and will carry a pilot and observer. The fire fighting crew, under direction of Jack Heinzelman of the forest service, will have 15 men during the summer.
