An array of past and present wrestling champions will highlight the weekly mat program at Medford armory tonight. The all-star card will be topped by the return of Georges Dusette, coast junior heavy-weight champion who has been away from the local grapple circle for a couple of weeks. Dusette will face "Gorgeous" George Wagner, of the varied collection of beautiful robes, when they square off in the six-round main event. The coast light-heavyweight crown formerly graced the brow of Wagner but the Eugene turkey grower is now gunning for the toga worn by the Canadian powerhouse.

It will be a non-title clash but a win by Wagner will put him in direct line to challenge Dusette to a show-down match.

Paavo Katonen, who lifted the belt from Wagner some time ago and lost it to Jack Kiser, is expected to have all the grappling he wants before his match with clever Kenny Ackles comes to an end, according to street-corner talk by fans. Ackles, one of the most outstanding matmen ever to show hereabouts, has firmly established himself dear to the hearts of lovers of the art of wrestling. They will tangle in the four-round semi-windup.

Local fans will get their first glimpse of Speed Maloney when the classy fire-ball goes against Antonio Leone, the Oyster Bay, N. Y., toughie, in the three-round opener. Leone's eye-jabbing and general roughhouse maneuvers make him a feared gladiator but Maloney's speed and mat science figure to offset Leone's tactics. They are slated to start the program promptly at 8:30.

O'DOULMEN TAKE DOUBLE HEADER WIN OVER OAKS

Hollywood whipped Los Angeles, 9-0, and then received for a 4-0 defeat; Seattle nosed out Portland, 3-2, but the Beavers won the second game, 4-2, to maintain their game and one-half leadership; San Diego stopped Sacramento, 5-2, and the Solons came back for a 4-1 triumph in the finale.

New York, May 31—(U.P.)—America's first holiday since victory in Europe brought a quarter of a million war-weary fans to major league baseball games yesterday, but as for seeing anything definite accomplished in either pennant race, all of them might as well have stayed on their front porches.

The largest crowd to see a baseball game since the Japanese attack on Pearl Harbor turned out for the Yankee-Tiger doubleheader at Yankee stadium, with the total running to 70,906. The Yankees dropped the first game 3 to 2. They won the second, 3 to 2, however, on timely hitting by George Stinnett.

Ott Sets Record
 Pittsburgh ran its streak of victories to nine in the National, beating the visiting Brooklyn Dodgers, 13 to 5, in the opener. Brooklyn took the second game 14 to 10.

The leading New York Giants

won the first game against the Cubs at Chicago, 8 to 6, then dropped the second, 11 to 2. Manager Mel Ott of the Giants set a new National league record for total bases when he hit a double and single in the opener to bring his lifetime mark to 4,889, two better than the 4,888 total of Honus (Hans) Wagner, Pittsburgh Pirate immortal.

The Braves kept the defending champion Cardinals from gaining at St. Louis, winning the second game 9 to 2, after the Red Birds took the opener in 12 innings, 4 to 2.

The Reds took over sixth place in the National by beating the visiting Philadelphia Phillies at Cincinnati twice, 4 to 0 and 9 to 8 with a three run rally in the ninth of the second game.

Washington added to the humiliation of the champion St. Louis Browns on their current road trip by winning a twilight-night double header, 3 to 2, in 13 innings and, 5 to 0, behind Marino Pieretti's five-hit pitching.

Thornton Lee of the White Sox beat the A's, 5 to 2, in the opener at Philadelphia for his sixth win, but Russ Christopher countered that by winning, 4 to 2.

Ben Steiner kept the Red Sox from winning the opener when he dropped an easy pop-up in the ninth to permit Cleveland to score the tying run after which Pat Seerey doubled home the winning tally for a 4 to 2 Indian victory. The rookie Boston infielder atoned in the second game by singling home two runs in a big eighth inning rally which netted six runs and a 7 to 6 win.

Ideas for Spring Meals

CREAMED NEW POTATOES AND PEAS
 Add cooked, peeled, new potatoes and cooked peas to medium thick white sauce, sprinkle with paprika.

RADISH SLAW
 Combine thinly sliced, washed radishes with salad dressing, season with salt and pepper, and garnish with parsley.

ASPARAGUS WITH MOCK HOLLANDAISE SAUCE
 Beat 1 egg white until stiff but not dry; fold in 1 cup mayonnaise. Pour to 1 1/2-inch thickness in shallow baking dish; place 4 to 5 minutes under very hot broiler until delicately browned, about 1 minute. Makes 1 cup. Serve over asparagus.

RHUBARB CREAM PIE
 3/4 cup sugar 1 tbsp. grated orange rind
 1 tsp. cinnamon 3 tbsps.
 4 tps. cornstarch 3 tbsps.
 1/2 tsp. salt orange marmalade
 2 cups cooked rhubarb
 Baked pastry shell

Combine sugar, cinnamon, cornstarch, and salt; add to rhubarb, and cook about 10 minutes, or until thickened, stirring constantly. Add orange rind and beaten egg yolks; cook 2 minutes longer, stirring constantly. Cool; pour into baked pastry shell. Beat egg whites until stiff and dry; fold in orange marmalade. Pile lightly on pie; bake 15 minutes, or until well browned, in slow oven (300°F.). Makes 19-inch pie. Serves 6.
