CRATERS THUMP BUTTE FALLS BY 17 TO 2 COUNT

The Medford Craters closed their practice season yesterday with a 17 to 2 victory over Butte Falls at the Fairgrounds park. Medford used three pitchers and every player in uniform in gaining the win, their second of the season.

The Southern Oregon league opens next Sunday with Medford playing the Klamath Falls Marines here, Butte Falls going to Ashland, and Central Point playing at Klamath Falls Navy. Dick Kidwell started on the mound for the Craters and gave up only two singles in three innings. Manager Paul Freer took over the rubber at end of the third and was smacked for a double and single with one run coming in. At beginning of the eighth frame George Barr took over the hurling chore and was touched for four hits with one run crossing the plate. Medford collected 18 blows off two Butte Falls chukkers with Freddie Stammen, Crater second sacker, getting a double and coming on home on the left fielder's error in the first innings. Babb, Medford center fielder,

had a big day at the plate, getting two singles and scoring one run out of two times up. Burnham, in left field, and Reedy, on first base, each hit two for three with Burnham getting one run and Reedy, two. Abbott, Logger second baseman, got three hits out of four times up. One was a double.

Nine Butte Falls errors greatly aided the Craters, who bungled but one play. Kidwell struck out three visiting batters, Freer fanned two and Barr whiffed one. Six Medford batsmen were struck out.

ESQUIRE MAILING RIGHTS RETAINED

Washington, June 4.—(U.P.)—The U. S. court of appeals today upheld Esquire Magazine's second class mailing privileges and denounced the post office department's "attempt to compel acceptance of its literary or moral standards."

Postmaster General Frank C. Walker, who will be replaced July 1 by Democratic National Chairman Robert E. Hannegan, had suspended Esquire's second class mailing privileges. The post office held that the magazine's Varga Girl drawing and other material were morally substandard, and a district court upheld its ruling.

The appeals court, however, reversed this decision. It said censorship, freedom of the press, and freedom of competitive enterprise were at stake.

Oregon Second In Clothes Collection

Portland, Ore., June 4.—(U.P.)—Oregon placed second—behind California and ahead of Washington—in the recent national united nation clothing collection, according to word today in receipt from the national chairman, Henry J. Kaiser.

Oregonians contributed an estimated 1,353,089 pounds of clothing, to average 2.44 pounds per contribution. Californians contributed 10,160,693 pounds, averaging 3.28 pounds each, and Washingtonians 1,077,699 pounds, averaging .89 pounds per contributor.

Poles Move Into German Territory

London, June 4.—(U.P.)—Poland prepared today to move 7,500,000 persons into former German territory and perhaps oust all Germans from the country. A broadcast from Lublin said the Russian-sponsored Polish government intended to send 1,000,000 into northern and northwestern territories taken from the reich. Another 1,000,000 would go to Silesia, 1,500,000 to upper Silesia, and four million to unspecified urban areas.

SS Commander Gets Sentence Of Death

Rome, June 4.—(U.P.)—Pietro Koch, notorious SS commander, was sentenced to death today by a jury that deliberated only two hours.

The prosecutor asked the death penalty for Koch for the death of hundreds of Italian patriots and for collaboration with the Germans.

Koch was held responsible for the death and torture of hundreds during the Nazi occupation of Rome.

MOST ICELAND SERVICE MEN TO BE HOME SOON

Stockholm, June 4.—(U.P.)—Most of the American soldiers on Iceland will leave for home within the next four or five months, the Swedish newspaper Dagens reported today.

Dagens quoted Brig. Gen. Martinus Stenseth as saying that after that time Iceland no longer will be needed as a military base.

High Court Upholds Right To Challenge Security, Exchange

Washington, June 4.—(U.P.)—The supreme court today upheld the right of stockholders to challenge securities and exchange commission orders affecting their corporations.

The court affirmed a second circuit court of appeals ruling refusing to dismiss the complaint of Samuel Okin, owner of 9,000 shares of Electric Bond & Share common stock.

Okin's suit asked for a review of an SEC order approving a plan for the refunding of a \$30,000,000 debt owed Electric Bond and Share by its subsidiary, American & Foreign Power Co., Inc. Okin claimed the plan was detrimental to Electric Bond & Share stockholders.

In another ruling, the court reversed a first circuit court of appeals decision dismissing a suit of American Power & Light Co., protesting an SEC order

against Florida Power & Light Co.
