22 ENTRIES FOR KENTUCKY DERBY EVENT SATURDAY

Louisville, Ky., June 6.—(U.P.)—A wide open race which may draw as many as 22 entries matching the largest field ever to run for the roses, promised today to attract the largest crowd in the history of American racing to the Kentucky Derby Saturday.

Col. Matt Winn predicted that the gate would exceed the estimated 95,000 who saw Whirlaway win the 1941 classic. All seats were sold out yesterday. Winn said, whereas on the record attendance day reserved space still was available a day before the race.

Despite war-time travel conditions and restrictions which limited the sale of tickets to those living in the Louisville metropolitan area, indications were that this fourth wartime derby not only would draw a record crowd, but also one of the largest fields ever to face a starting gun in the race which has become, if not the richest, at least the most coveted in the nation.

Time trials today and tomorrow will determine the number of three-year-olds which will go to the barrier with Col. C. V. Whitney's Jeep rated a 3 to 1 favorite. It appeared certain that for the first time since 1936 a filly will go to the post.

Each was at bat 31 times and collected 12 hits for a .387 mark. Red Davis, who saw action as a relief pitcher and pinch hitter, stepped to the plate 15 times and slammed out four blows for a .266 figure.

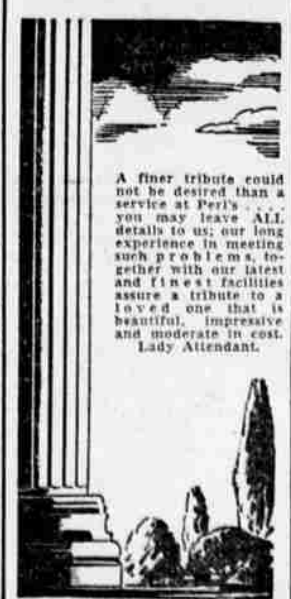
Other percentages were Don Waldron, 27 times up, seven hits for .259; LeRoy House at bat 22 times, five hits for .227; Fred Stammen batted 19 times four hits, for .210; Bill Todd was up five times, got one hit, for .200; Jim Cave batted 27 times, got five blows, for .185; Al Kircher batted 25 times, four hits, for .160; Carl Reich up 18 times, two hits, for .111 and Bill Eatherton tried 20 times, got two hits, for .100.

Barring military induction and other losses, all except Fawcett and Eatherton will be back for next year's team. They graduated.

Medford played four league games and four practice tilts and suffered only one loss, that to Grants Pass. They ended the season in a tie with Grants Pass for first place in the league but other school activities prevented a play-off.
