MONEY deducted from pay envelopes is money which goes directly to the Treasury and thereby has its inflationary fangs removed.

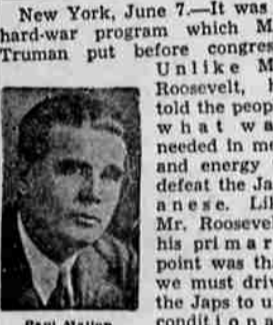

News Behind The News By Paul Mallon



New York, June 7.—It was a hard war program which Mr. Truman put before congress. Unlike Mr. Roosevelt, he told the people what was needed in men and energy to defeat the Japanese.

I saw one critique which put the matter this way: Mr. Roosevelt was a frustrated person trying to imitate in this war General "Unconditional Surrender" Grant in the civil war, who earned his nickname at Fort Donaldson but gave generous terms to Lee at Appomattox.

I think I can demonstrate if you will read on, that any procedure except the Roosevelt-Truman policy of unconditional surrender is not only impracticable, but impossible—the hope of many people to save lives by offering conditional surrender is founded on an unsound understanding of military history, particularly the same civil war.

THE Japanese war is being conducted by a ruling military clique with the full support of the people. No terms to the clique are possible because these would mean the end of the persons who operate it.

Try to write some terms to encourage them to revolution and you will see how impossible is the task. One critique I saw suggested we offer the people

CALIFORNIA FINDS STATE IN RED AS MEASURES PASSED

Sacramento, June 7.—(AP)—The state of California potentially was \$60,000,000 in the red today on the basis of special money bills approved by committees of the two houses of the legislature.

Included in the special appropriations bills receiving assembly approval was one to appropriate \$15,000,000 for the purchase of beaches and parks for public use.

The committee also voted on a bill increasing the standard payment for needy blind persons from \$50 to \$60 a month, and recommended a bill to extend \$35 a month payments to permanently disabled persons.

Also approved was a bill to increase the state's share of costs of tuberculosis sanitariums by \$1,000,000 each two years and a measure to set up a new state division of dental health at a cost of \$229,000.
