

TRUMAN SUGGESTS SOLON PAY RAISE

Washington, June 8—(U.P.)—Members of the House, who voted themselves a \$2,500 tax-free expense account, were pleased but a bit wary today over President Truman's suggestion that they vote themselves \$5,000 to \$15,000 annual pay raise.

Mr. Truman told a news conference yesterday that if congressmen wanted more money they should come straight out and raise their salaries. He said he would sign a bill giving members between \$15,000 and \$25,000 a year. They now get \$10,000.

The roll call by which the House approved the \$2,500 expense item for each member included the following votes: Republicans for—Ellsworth and Mott. Oregon for—Angell, Oregon.

EX-GERMAN CAPTIVE HOME ON FURLOUGH

Cpl. William Kime, who was taken prisoner by the Germans Dec. 17 during the battle of the Belgium bulge, arrived in Medford Monday for a 60-day furlough with his parents, Mr. and Mrs. Wilbur Kime, Griffin Creek and other members of the family. Cpl. Kime was in a tank de-

stroyer unit when taken prisoner. He was released in April after having been in various camps.

Upon expiration of his furlough the corporal will report at Santa Barbara for reassignment. A sister stated yesterday that the corporal has already regained the weight which he lost on a prison diet and "looks fine now." His brother, Pvt. John Kime, is in Italy with the army.
